TO PROMOTE OCEAN AIR LINE.

French Aviator Here in Interest of New Project. Among the passengers on board the steamship Themistocles of the National Greek Line, in yesterday from Constantinople and Algiers, was Capt. Alec Pagney of the French Aviator Corps, who was an aid to Gen. Foch when he visited this country.

Lieut. Pagney said that his visit was in connection with the incorporation of a company which would operate French airplanes in the United States. He said he also would talk over a service between New York and Plymouth, England.

The Captain said that he expected the journey across the ocean could be made in forty-eight hours with three stops to replenish the gasoline and oil tanks at anchored platforms along the way. The planes would carry four passengers.
