The decorations of the grounds are entirely unlike those of any previous fair here, and with the booths in blue, yellow and red, the effect is that of an old country fair of a century ago.

The Midway, which is being arranged under the auspices of the Boy Scouts of America, will present many attractions, including a booth for the sale of Eskimo pies, which to-day was being decorated by Mrs. Thomas L. Chaudron.
