Brazil is just now the objective of many of the seagoing tourists. Among the noted visiting preachers in New York to-morrow will be the Rev. W. I. Chamberlain, who will preach at the Collegiate Church of St. Nicholas, Fifth avenue and Forty-eighth street.

Dr. Chamberlain, corresponding secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Reformed Church, was born in India, the son of an American missionary, and after graduation from Rutgers College and New Brunswick Seminary worked in missions in India for many years.

Dr. Chamberlain was at one time president of Voorhees College, Vellore, India, and served for a time as Mayor of that city. He returned to America in 1905 and after brief occupancy of the chair of basic and mental philosophy at Rutgers took up his present work.

The Right Rev. Sidney Catlin Partridge, Bishop of West Missouri, will preach at the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist to-morrow morning and afternoon.

The topic will be "Religious Questions Arising from Modern Trends of Thought—Prayer."

An outdoor religious service will be held in the grove at 7:15 P. M. Dr. William E. Holt, professor of economics, presiding. The subject will be "Man

and Women as Active Partners in Politics and Religion." There will be music and informal addresses.

Open Evangelistic Campaign. The Gospel Tabernacle, Forty-fourth street and Eighth avenue, will have the opening service to-morrow morning of the New York Evangelistic Campaign, scheduled to run until September 11. Robert Dooley Expires After Wedding Fete for Son.

His family believed that his death had been caused by a stroke of apoplexy precipitated by the excitement attending the celebration of the marriage of his son, Gordon Dooley, and Miss Martha Morton, member of the popular vaudeville team of the Four Mortons.

The elder Dooley was highly elated by the wedding last week, which was a runaway affair and lasted two well-known stage families. Since then he had been attending numerous wedding parties with friends and relatives. At noon on Thursday he went to the home of his son, John Dooley, with whom he has been staying, at 254 West Fifty-fourth street, since he arrived from his own home in Philadelphia to attend the wedding festivities.
