

THE THOUSAND ISLANDS YACHT CLUB ALONG LONG ISLAND SOUND

Lake to Be Formed by Damming River At Elizabethtown

Summer Colony's Plans for a Body of Water Nearby Are About to Be Realized.

ELIZABETHTOWN, N. Y., Aug. 19.

THE determination of members of the Elizabethtown summer colony to have a lake, which in previous seasons has found expression in discussion, is now apparently settled and a meeting of the Board of Trade is to be held in the Essex County Court House here this evening of Wednesday, Aug. 23, at which it is confidently expected powers will be conferred upon a committee to go ahead with the construction of the dam across the Boquet River. The dam, which is to be of concrete, is to be 150 feet long and 25 feet high at the highest point. The lake will be two miles long and one-quarter of a mile wide, and it is the aim of officials of the Board of Trade, of which Mr. Edward F. Plummer of New York is president, to have it ready for next season. The undertaking, which in its present form has been modified as related to the original proposition, calls for an outlay of approximately \$100,000.

Mr. L. E. Parley, proprietor of the Windsor Hotel, has adopted the policy of Mahomet toward the mountain and in the absence of a lake here has leased a beach front property of about eight miles distant, at the same time putting in service a large motor bus, which during the remainder of the season will make two trips daily between Elizabethtown and the lake.
