SISLER SUPREME AS HITTER AND RUNNER

Leads Majors With .413—Has 42 Stolen Bases to His Credit.

While the National League holds the world championship and has its full share of great ball players, the leadership in a great many departments must be conceded to the American League.

- Greatest in power—Babe Ruth, Yankees.
Greatest hitter—George Sisler, Browns.
Greatest throwing arm—Bob Meusel, Yankees.
Sweetest infielder—Eddie Collins, White Sox.
Most graceful outfielder—Tris Speaker, Indians.
Fastest base runner—George Sisler, Browns.

Of course you could get up quite a number of subdivisions, such as a first baseman, best second baseman, and so on. But the above headings take into consideration the major factors—and supremacy in each department appears to be well defined.

With a batting average of .413 Sisler leads the major leagues. With a base stealing record of 42 Sisler again leads the Big Show—though not by a big margin.

Tris Speaker is the greatest first baseman in the game. There are some who believe that he is greater than even Hal Chase in his prime.
