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Museum Has Horse Armor Saved From Italy's Shell Fire

Two Equestrian Coverings Increases Metropolitan's Collection to Five.

It was announced yesterday from the Metropolitan Museum of Art that its armor collection is richer by the addition of two fine suits of horse armor because a certain Italian battery in a most fortunate way so that it fell a trifle short of being destructive to all property within range.

When the Italians decided to advance their lines on the Flaviae they bombarded an old castle in which was stored a great deal of old treasure, including notable armor. The caretaker, seeing the peril, had the objects in the armor collection loaded into farm wagons and started for Vienna.

One by one, however, these conveyances were not only hit but utterly destroyed by shell fire until only the cart bearing the objects now in the Metropolitan reached safety.

The owner, discouraged because so little was left of his fine collection, decided to part with the fragment that remained.

Trivial as this fragment was to its former owner, it swells the total of complete horse panoplies in the Metropolitan to five and promises, according to the museum's announcement, on a favorable fielding with the best in Europe.

In the Tower of London there are seven in Paris five, in Dresden seven in Vienna three, in Madrid seven and in Berlin six, with very few other complete suits being recorded.

The two examples just added are of northern Italy, the armor, though heavily etched with Renaissance traceries, and are credited to a period approximately the middle of the sixteenth century.

Neither suit has a helmet, though a figure has been found for one of them among the armor in the collection. The museum also announces that there would be, commencing October 18, and lasting for an hour, an exhibition of more than a hundred examples of furniture from the workshop of Duncan Phyfe.

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LAST LIVING PALLBEARER OF LINCOLN DIES AT 82

Was Retired From New Haven Police Force in 1917.

NEW HAVEN, Sept. 17.—Henry M. Crocker, one of the last of the twelve pallbearers who bore President Lincoln to his grave was established by a photograph of the group in Crocker's possession, which was taken immediately after the President's funeral.

On the back of the photograph were the names of each of the pallbearers with their records. Crocker was born in the village of West, N. Y., in 1841 and lived on his father's farm until the Civil war when he enlisted in Company D, Twenty-second New York Volunteers.

He was wounded at Mechanicville and was mustered out in 1864, when he was assigned to guard duty at Washington. It was while on this duty that he was selected as one of the pallbearers. After the war Crocker came to New Haven and worked as a blacksmith. Later he was appointed to serve on the police force and was retired in 1917.

RICHARD B. ANGUS DEAD. One of Canada's Railroad Builders and Bankers.

MONTREAL, Sept. 17.—Richard B. Angus, once president of the Erie and Montreal, died at his country home at Senneville in his ninety-second year. He was a director of the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Montreal Street Railway.

Mr. Angus did much for the development of the Dominion by the successful carrying through of the Canadian Pacific Railway, a corporation which he had organized in 1881. Starting with the Bank of Montreal sixty-five years ago as a junior clerk, he rose in ten years to be general manager. Later he became a member of the board and finally its president, retiring in 1913.
