

## I.R.T. AND B.R.T. ADD 214 TRAINS TO-NIGHT

Increase Now Totals 360 on Interborough Subways and 'Ls' Since May 31.

### SERVICE FOR RUSH HOUR

Brooklyn Lines to Have Seat for Every Passenger in Midday Travel.

Improvement in the coal situation, as certified by William H. Woodin, State Fuel Administrator, animated the Transit Commission yesterday to order material increases in service on both elevated and subway lines of the Interborough and the Brooklyn Rapid Transit companies the first thing to-morrow morning at one minute after midnight. This is the second important increase demanded of the Interborough within six months. It supplements the sweeping order of May 31 under which 216 trains and 2,914 cars daily were added. The new order to the Interborough increases the existing service by 114 trains, making a total increase of 360 trains over the operation previous to May 31. Hereafter, in midday non-rush hours, trains will be run on a three-minute interval instead of a four-minute headway. Wherever possible there will be an increase of service in rush hours.

The order to the B. R. T. requires an additional 100 trains a day, sixty in rush hours and forty in non-rush hours. It is proposed to make a further addition to service of thirty-five trains on November 15. The effect of this order is substantially to provide an equivalent of a seat for every passenger.

The Transit Commission also required the two companies to purchase 400 thoroughly modern steel subway cars, 250 for the Interborough and fifty for the B. R. T. The Interborough has ordered 100 of these cars and will get the remainder when the city provides yard space in which to equip and inspect them. The B. R. T. needs more than fifty cars, but its financial situation is such that the commission is withholding further demands.

On both the Interborough and the B. R. T. the service to-morrow will represent the maximum possible until the new cars can be put into service. After that further relief can come only through the building of new subways.

The new B. R. T. schedules provide for a train every minute and a half-forty trains an hour—during midday from the De Kalb avenue station to Manhattan via both the Montague street tunnel and the Manhattan Bridge. The service by the Montague street

tunnel during midday will be increased 50 per cent, providing a train every two and a half minutes from downtown Brooklyn, Court street and De Kalb avenue stations, through lower Manhattan to Fifty-seventh street. This increase is effected by extending to Prospect Park the present midday local service operated on weekdays from Whitehall street, South Ferry, to Queensboro Plaza. The Montague street tunnel service will provide the shortest interval between trains on all of the subway lines connecting the business and shopping districts of Brooklyn and Manhattan.

The Prospect Park-Queensboro Plaza service, in conjunction with the regular Brighton Line midday service, will provide a train every three and three-quarter minutes from the Prospect Park, Seventh avenue and Atlantic avenue stations to downtown Brooklyn and lower Manhattan by way of the Montague street tunnel. This represents 100 per cent increase in service.

### PASSENGER TAKEN OFF TRAIN AS PICKPOCKET

Detectives Say Suspect Has Long Criminal Record.

### IRVINGTON DEDICATES WAR MEMORIAL GROUP


Two Gold Star Mothers Unveil Heroic Bronze Figures.
