

Only as formidable, had its inception among the vanquished troops brought from Smyrna to the islands of Mytilene and Chios, and among the soldiers at Saloniki. Strangely enough, however, the two revolts have had different objects—the former aimed at the overthrow of the Government and King Constantine and the latter at the defense of Thrace against the Turks.

LEAGUE HARMONY IS ONLY APPARENT

Scandinavians and Others Show They Are Not Ready for Disarmament.

ALL SUBMIT TO PLAN

Resolution Presents Idea to Governments, Praising Washington Parley.

NOT AGREED ON TURKEY

Opposition to Admitting Her to League, Especially From Latin Americans.

The revolt quickly spread to the navy and many of the warships refused to answer queries sent out by the Admiralty. The Mytilene and Chios revolts were apparently the most formidable. They quickly won supporters, with the result that the King on being presented with an ultimatum demanding a new government, immediately accepted the resignation of his ministers and proclaimed a state of siege in Athens.

In the meantime, Greek warships manned by insurrectionists are steaming to Greece from the two islands to enforce the edict of the revolutionists. The immediate cause of the revolt was an order for the evacuation of these islands, the men wishing to keep their rifles as trophies or perhaps for personal protection.

The first intimation the authorities in Athens had of the movement was in an airplane flying over the city, which showed pamphlets drawn up "in the name of the army and navy and the population of Mytilene," demanding the resignation of the government and the abdication of Constantine.

Official circles here believe former Premier Venizelos has had no part in the revolt. Because of his importance, however, and his large personal following, the Government is anxious that he will hardly be able to avoid figuring in the subsequent developments.

It is recalled that the former Premier stated that he would work with the Crown Prince, but not with King Constantine. This was, however, before the latter was recalled to the throne. The Crown Prince is said to be a favorite of Princess Anastasia, the former Mrs. William Leeds.

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COPENHAGEN, Sept. 27.—The announcement of the abdication of King Constantine of Greece arrived here today. It has been rumored that he was negotiating to obtain permission to reside in Denmark. It is understood Dowager Queen Olga of Greece, who has been visiting Denmark recently, has taken up her residence at the same castle as the former Dowager Empress of Russia.

Battleship Crew Mutinies. CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 27 (Associated Press).—The crew of the Greek battleship Averoff mutinied today and left Constantinople for an unknown destination. The commander of the vessel was ashore to bid farewell to Gen. Harington. When later he attempted to board the Averoff by means of a private launch the sailors hurled missiles at him. The vessel sailed at noon today. Previously the allied diplomats had stated that the presence of the Averoff in Constantinople imperiled the prospects of peace.

There are 15,000 revolting troops in the Greek revolutionist expedition to Mytilene which has gone to the Greek mainland, according to a wireless dispatch from Capt. J. B. Rhodes of the American destroyer Litchfield at Mytilene. The message says that the troops have been landed at Piraeus, the port of Athens, with the demand for the abdication of King Constantine in favor of the Crown Prince.

KEMALISTS PREPARING FOR PEACE CONFERENCE British Are Confident of Frustrating Their Coup. Special Cable to THE NEW YORK HERALD. Copyright, 1922, by THE NEW YORK HERALD.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 27.—The occupation by Kemal cavalry of Kum Telek and other villages in the neutral zone of the Dardanelles is interpreted as a move on the part of the Nationalists to strengthen their position for the final peace conference. It is clearly their intention to concentrate at these strategic points sufficient troops to give them a formidable weapon with which to threaten the British if the parleys in rupture. Many believe these demonstrations to be nothing more than a faint masking real intentions to strike elsewhere should the negotiations collapse.

Meanwhile the British continue to strengthen their land forces at Chanak and their naval display in the Bosphorus. Additional naval units passed through the straits today, bringing the total number of ships of war of all classes which have arrived during the last few days to thirty-eight. More units of the Atlantic fleet will arrive to-morrow.

The Highland Light Infantry and the King's own Scottish Borderers are the latest to reach Chanak. Five additional regiments totaling 15,000 rifles are on the way, bringing the strength of the land forces to 35,000, which may be reinforced by marines, making more than a match for Kemal's men.

ROME, Sept. 27 (Associated Press).—Pope Pius today telegraphed Mustafa Kemal Pasha urging that the Turkish revolution be ended by a feasible measure to avoid further bloodshed.

ARMY IN SALONIKI SETS UP GOVERNMENT Airplanes Take Orders to Macedonia and Thrace. SALONIKI, Greece, Sept. 27 (Associated Press).—A council of officers of an independent division which returned here from Smyrna and which is directing the anti-Constantinople movement, today appointed Col. Tsipouras, commanding the Fifty-third Regiment of the division, as high military commissioner of the Saloniki region, with the mission of preserving order at all costs.

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Anastasia Denies She Sought Asylum for King

ALTHOUGH reports of Constantine's abdication have been confirmed by all agencies and in Governmental circles to-night the King's brother, Prince Christopher husband of the former Mrs. William B. Leeds, at the Ritz, refused to credit them, as he has received no word from any member of the family in Athens or elsewhere that abdication was imminent.

The Prince authorized an explicit denial that Princess Anastasia was interested in the welfare of the abdicating King or had offered him a home in New York, as reported in the British press. "The Princess is not interested in political changes in Greece in any way," he said, "and she has certainly not approached the Washington Government or allowed any one to approach it in her name to seek asylum for the King."

mediately to accept the armistice scheme, thereby putting up to the Allies all responsibility for handling the Greeks, one Turkish expert here declared: "The Turks never had the reputation of accepting a settlement under pressure by a vanquished enemy. Personally I consider it more likely that the Allies' failure to control the Greeks will provide a situation leading to the very verge of disaster."

The French Foreign office analysts that it has received no official indication as to Kemal's attitude, but it is reported in French military circles that Gen. Pelle's first orders from the Ankara Government gave rise to increased optimism. The Qual d'Orsay does not expect Kemal to reply in full until he has conferred with Franklin Bouillon, who, incidentally, is now slated as France's first post-war Ambassador to Constantinople.

Dispatches will be handed to M. Bouillon upon his arrival in Smyrna to-morrow depicting the new dangers of the situation and authorizing him to give France's assurance that she has not altered her views as expressed in Saturday's joint note of invitation to Kemal, but will support the Turkish claims against Greek aggression at all hazards.

At the same time it is reported that the French and the Italians are considering the proposal of an immediate armistice with the last week's agreement in which it will be provided that none of the allied Powers or their nationals be permitted to furnish either material or financial aid of any kind to the Greeks or the Turks pending peace negotiations. This, if adopted, will effectively cripple Greek plans, as it is reported in financial circles here that Greece is actually short of new credits for foodstuffs since the army's debacle in Smyrna.

U. S. SENDS 12 MORE DESTROYERS TO EAST

Proceed to Constantinople on Request of Bristol.

SPECIAL DISPATCH TO THE NEW YORK HERALD. Copyright, 1922, by THE NEW YORK HERALD. Reinforcement of the American fleet in Near Eastern waters was ordered by the Government today. Secretary Denby directed that two divisions of destroyers, consisting of twelve vessels, proceed from Norfolk to Constantinople.

This action was taken following receipt of a dispatch from Rear Admiral Bristol, the American High Commissioner at Constantinople, recommending that one or two divisions of destroyers be sent immediately for the better protection of American interests and lives in the devastated territory.

Admiral Bristol already has six destroyers in his division, but the work of transporting refugees has apparently proved too much for this squadron, which had at the same time to attend to the task of safeguarding the interests of the United States. The step is a move on the part of Admiral Bristol and is no sense a development of American policy.

REDS BLAME ITALIAN PRESS.

Soviet Delegate Says Criticism Impedes His Efforts.

ROME, Sept. 27.—M. Vorovsky, the Soviet delegate in Italy, in a letter read before the Italian Ministers at a Cabinet meeting today, protested against the attitude of certain sections of the Italian press against the Soviets, which, he said, impedes his efforts to establish cordial commercial relations between the two countries.

BRITAIN WOULD ASK SOVIET TO PARLEY

Believes Plan for Straits Satisfies Russia, but Wants Her Invited.

SEGREGATING THE GREEKS

Every Effort Made to Remove Them From Fields of Action

Two sets of reports are being received here, one that Mustafa Kemal Pasha will be influenced by the Turkish Nationalist moderates and the other that he is determined to press his military advantage. In the face of these reports British officials are preserving an armed neutrality attitude and is still rushing reinforcements to the East.

As far as the Russian note goes, Downing Street recognizes the justice of all that Moscow says. It recognizes that a real peaceful settlement cannot be reached in the Bosphorus without Russian cooperation. Lord Curzon and Premier Lloyd George are eager to get Russia into the conference.

Downing Street believes that the plan of settlement advanced in the Allies' note will satisfy Russia and there is nothing to be lost by inviting Moscow representatives to the conference. If they are not invited the British see the possibility of renewed trouble in the East, not only through the Bolsheviks themselves but through the spirit of insubordination they are able to instill in the Turkish army.

Compared with the Russian situation the abdication of King Constantine is insignificant. Reports reaching here indicate that two distinct movements are responsible for Constantine's retirement. First is the army move, coming from Chios and Mytilene, where the population and the army generally were disturbed by the fact that Athens ignored the traditional Greek procedure of permitting the demobilized soldiers to keep their arms for private use.

The other movement apparently is from Salonika, where the military claim is that the Turkish claims demand a bitter end fight for Thrace. It is the view of Downing Street, however, that the Greeks already have effectively eliminated themselves and are unable to fight Thrace.

Every resource of British diplomacy is being exerted to eliminate the Greeks from the situation. Every Greek warship except two destroyers which are standing by for refugees have been forced to leave the Dardanelles, the Sea of Marmora and the Propontis. It is authoritatively denied here that any Greek troops are with the British at Chanak, and it is declared that the Greeks will have no part in the defense of Constantinople if a defense against the Kemalists becomes necessary.

Admiral De Robeck has not yet made a report on his instructions to get in touch with Kemal, and the Turkish cavalry is still in the neutral zone, but Downing Street hopes that everybody will keep his head and not precipitate trouble until the conference meets.

BRITAIN MUST FIGHT, LUDENDORFF THINKS

Recruiting Continues in Germany for Service With Turks.

Although Chancellor Wirth has declared that Germany is not interested in the Turkish crisis there is an atmosphere of tense curiosity in German military and national circles. Opinion is divided as to the likelihood of a Turco-British war.

Gen. Ludendorff thinks that the British must fight, though they will sacrifice their prestige whether they remain or withdraw. He foresees Bolshevik agitation to overturn British hegemony in the middle Orient.

Gen. Liman von Sanders thinks trouble unlikely because "the British know that a war against Kemal would arouse the entire Mohammedan world and there would be danger of a holy war. Why are the British making so much ado, with their 20,000 graves in Gallipoli, whereas the Turks have lost 60,000 defending their own soil?"

The Turco-German Officers Association still is busy recruiting volunteers among the guard regiments for service with the Turkish army.

Venizelos Rests by Sea, Awaiting a Distinct Call

PARIS, Sept. 27 (Associated Press).—M. Venizelos, who was prostrated by the Greek disaster, went to Deauville for rest and quiet. He has been informed of the latest turn in the situation at Athens by his friends in Paris and will make no plans until he has received full advice. It is understood that he expects to return to Paris Friday.

The former Premier's adherents doubt he will join any new Ministry at present but incline to the belief that he will play a more effective role by acting as Greece's representative at the peace conference. In any case M. Venizelos will take no part in affairs until endorsed by popular mandate.

NATIONALISTS DRAW UP PEACE PARLEY TERMS

Demand to Occupy Thrace Before Conference Is Held.

SMYRNA, Sept. 27 (Associated Press).—Yusef Kemal Bey, the Nationalist Foreign Minister, left for Ankara today with the draft of the Nationalists' reply to the allied peace proposals. It is understood to embrace the following conditions:

1. Prior to the opening of the peace conference the Nationalists shall occupy all strategic points in order to achieve the provisions of the Nationalist pact regarding Thrace.

2. All British forces now en route shall be recalled, and the British shall abstain from fortifying the neutral zones.

3. The Nationalists shall occupy Thrace before the peace conference.

4. The Nationalists reserve the right to contest certain other points in the allied proposals.

5. The Nationalists object to the demilitarization of Thrace and Marmora, but no objection is raised to fortification of the Dardanelles.

6. Soviet Russia, Ukraine and all countries bordering on the Black Sea shall be represented in the conference.

7. In the event of acceptance of the foregoing conditions the Nationalists agree to an armistice conference at Mudania with the allied Generals.

8. Three days after the Mudania conference the proposed peace negotiations shall begin at Smyrna.

Isma Pasha, Commander in Chief on the western front, will represent the Nationalists at the armistice conference, while Mustafa Kemal Pasha will be spokesman at the Smyrna conference.

ALBANIAN REBELS SWOOP UPON CAPITAL

Bandits Succeed Serbs in Show Staged for League.

Last year's assembly was troubled by reports of belligerent Serbs invading Albania, but reports from Trieste to-day indicate that the Tirana Government is now in danger of being besieged by partisans of the bandit chieftain Bairam Zar.

Two thousand of his irregulars already have entered southern Albania and after eight hours' conflict with the Albanian regular army were compelled to retire in the direction of Scutari, leaving the regions of Natesia and Miriza in the hands of the invaders. Tirana is reported to have sent reinforcements, but the irregulars also are bringing new bands, heavily armed, across the frontiers.

SOCOLOW KIDNAPING TO BE INVESTIGATED

New York Detectives Alleged to Have Helped.

An investigation into the kidnaping of Walter Socolow from the County Court House building by Baltimore detectives last week will be held at Police Headquarters at 11 o'clock to-morrow morning before Joseph Faurot, Third Deputy Police Commissioner. Attorneys for Socolow accused the New York police of acting in co-operation with Baltimore detectives.

MEXICAN SENATE PASSES DEBT PACT

Agreement With Bankers Here Now Goes to President.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 27.—By a unanimous vote to-day the Mexican Senate approved the financial agreement signed last long ago by Secretary de la Huerta and the international bankers in New York. The agreement was approved by the Chamber of Deputies two weeks ago and now goes to the President for his signature. The President has already declared himself to be in favor of the agreement so his signature is assured.

REFUSES TO PUT BAN ON BOOK 'SATIRICON'

Magistrate Won't Judge by Present Standards.

MAGISTRATE Charles A. Oberwager, sitting as referee, gave an opinion yesterday in which he refused to condemn and suppress as an obscene book "The Satiricon of Petronius Arbiter," a classical satire on the times of Nero and the decadent Roman Empire.

Charles J. Hamberger, an agent of the Society for the Suppression of Vice, was complainant in the case. Joint defendants were Boni & Liverly, Inc., publishers, and Harry J. Salberg, publisher, with selling a copy of the book. The suit is being contested by the defendants. The Magistrate said: "If one is to condemn simply because of the existence of isolated passages of obscenity, a fate of obliteration and oblivion awaits Shakespeare, Chaucer, Voltaire, Rousseau, Balzac, Flaubert, De Maupassant, Zola, Poe and even the Bible."

DULLES DIVORCE SUIT IS LAID TO HOTEL LIFE

Wife Alleges Health Failed as Result of Treatment.

A story of a young bride being taken from her customary family environment and compelled to live in a hotel room and dine at "rotisseries" in the neighborhood until her health failed was told in the Supreme Court yesterday by Henry Eglington, attorney for Mrs. Grace Crossman Dulles, in the proceedings in which she is seeking from L. Harrison Dulles.

The suit is being contested by Dulles, and the charges were described by his lawyer, Clinton T. Taylor, as "malicious lies."

HUNDREDS POISONED BY HIGH SCHOOL LUNCH

Students at Birmingham Collapse in Streets.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 27.—Several hundred students of the Woodlawn High School here were stricken with pro-malicious poisoning, which the authorities assign to food eaten at the school's lunchroom at noon to-day. Many are seriously ill but early to-night no fatalities had been reported.
