

THREE DIE IN DAY BY MOTORS IN CITY

Barney Oldfield's Racing Car, Stolen From Garage, Wrecked, One Dead.

SPEEDING AT 70 MILES

Boy of Six Among Victims—Helper on Truck Misses Footing and Dies.

Three persons were killed and three severely injured in this city yesterday as the result of automobile accidents.

One accident was the result of an early morning joy ride along Riverside Drive in a stolen racing car owned by Barney Oldfield that crashed into the curb while traveling at seventy miles an hour, killing one man and injuring two of his three companions.

The Oldfield machine was taken from the Mid-Town Garage, 146 West Forty-ninth street, by Joseph O'Dowd, 30, a chauffeur of 265 West Twenty-eighth street, who picked up James F. Degnan, 23, of 3 West Ninety-eighth street, who was killed, and Edward O'Donnell, 29, of 44 West Twenty-sixth street, and Edward McKee, 32, of 590 Eleventh avenue, both of whom were injured and are now under arrest.

James Hughes, 36, of 512 West Fifty-fifth street, was killed in the street near his home when a truck driven by Albert Reich of 731 Eleventh avenue and owned by Benjamin Nathan, a painter, struck and crushed him.

Edward McCauley, 39, of 546 West Twenty-ninth street, a helper on a truck owned by the Shanker Steel Ceiling Company of 517 West Twenty-eighth street, was run over and crushed by the truck which he worked, when he jumped from it before it had stopped at Schiff Parkway near Eldridge street.

William Harris, 34, of 204 Thirtieth street, Brooklyn, suffered a fractured left hip when an automobile in which he was riding ran into that driven by Frank Dunn of 159 Bergen street, at Bedford avenue and Fulton street.
