

**ASKS BOND ASSURING ALIMONY PAYMENTS**

**Mrs. Sutton Declares Husband 'Entertained Manicurists and Actresses.'**

Mrs. Louise M. Sutton of 170 East Seventeenth street, Flatbush, who is receiving \$3,000 a year alimony from her husband, Francis M. Sutton, president of F. M. Sutton & Co., exporters, at 17 Battery place, under the provisions of a decree of separation entered in 1914, feels that he ought to put up a bond to secure the payments to her.

Her husband, she said, is 64 years old, lives at the Crescent Athletic Club on Pierpoint street in Brooklyn, and also has a country estate at Allenhurst, N. Y. He has been living in a "reckless, irresponsible" way at Allenhurst, she added, having entertained various women there, including "manicurists, modistes and moving picture actresses."

Mrs. Sutton said that he was given to Katharine Vanderpool, "who was a manicurist in a beauty parlor at Aabury Park," a large amount of money and property, including \$5,000 of the capital stock of Sutton & Co. and Liberty bonds. "He has stated," said Mrs. Sutton, "that he intends to transfer to her all of his property, as he has the greatest affection for and confidence in her."

Mrs. Sutton understands that her husband in 1919 conveyed valuable real estate to his son, Francis, and since then has sought to have the property conveyed to the defendant's sister and has offered his son \$1,000 to do it.

Mrs. Sutton added that her son has repeatedly protested to his father against his mode of living. Father and son went on a trip to Sydney, Australia, in 1921, when young Sutton was 24. While at Sydney, according to Mrs. Sutton, her husband received letters from the Vanderpool woman "and suddenly left Sydney and abandoned our son in that city."

Subsequently, said Mrs. Sutton, her husband wrote to his son, Sydney, stating that he, young Sutton, had been discharged from his employment with Sutton & Co. and had been disowned by his father.

The youth worked his way back to this country. Mrs. Sutton lives with her son, who, under the terms of the decree, was awarded to her husband, and daughter, Doris, for whose maintenance and education he is also responsible.

An order was signed by Justice Fawcett allowing Mrs. Sutton, through Samuel Evans Maires, counsel, to apply to the court to have the decree modified to provide that a bond shall be furnished.

When seen yesterday at the Crescent Athletic Club Mr. Sutton said to newspaper reporters: "Just say that I deny it all."

**A. D. FLINN CHOSEN FOR NEW ENGINEERING POST**

**Elected by Foundation as Part of Research Program.**

Election of Alfred D. Flinn as director of the Engineering Foundation, which is fostering organized industrial research on a nation wide scale, was announced yesterday by Charles F. Rand, chairman of the Foundation. He is the first incumbent of the post, created by the Foundation's governing board, composed of the four founder societies of civil, mining, mechanical and electrical engineers, to meet the expanding activities of the Foundation.

Mr. Flinn will retire as chairman of the engineering division of the National Research Council, but will continue as secretary of the United Engineering Society. Mr. Flinn, a resident of Yonkers, is a native of New Berlin, Pa., and a graduate of Worcester Polytechnic Institute.

The Engineering Foundation Board adopted the report of the executive committee, which recommended a continuance of intimate relations with the National Research Council, including financial support.

**WEEK'S LARGEST BET \$6,000 AT EVEN MONEY**

**Smith Backers Have \$5,000 More, but Ask 6 to 5 Odds.**

The largest wager on the coming election for Governor made in the financial district during the last week was one of \$6,000 at even money placed yesterday by W. L. Darnell & Co. That firm had an additional \$5,000 to lay at odds of 5 to 6 on Smith. Backers of Gov. Miller have nothing better than even money to offer on the chances of their favorite.

That confidence exists in both the Republican and Democratic camps is indicated by the large number of odd-idea bets already staked, the sums ranging from \$50 to \$10,000.

**SLAYING OF PARIS Laid to DOPE FEUD**

**Frank's Brother Santo Also in Plot Until Sent to Atlanta Prison in April.**

The slaying of Frank Parisi, an assistant supervisor of city markets, in front of 17 Monroe street on Friday by two unidentified assassins was the result of a dope peddling feud, it was learned yesterday. His brother, Santo, was involved in it until sentenced to serve three years in the Atlanta penitentiary in April of this year after being convicted of possessing and selling drugs.

Frank's criminal record became known after the killing. Like him, Santo had been arrested five times since 1905 but always either got a suspended sentence or was let off with fines on charges of disorderly conduct, burglary, carrying concealed weapons and alleged illegal voting.

Another brother, Thomas, is now serving as supervisor of city markets in the push cart district on Monroe and Oak streets. Thomas received the appointment in November, 1920, and Frank was made his assistant soon afterward.

In a statement issued recently when there had been charges that supervisors were grafting from push cart peddlers and others, Thomas said he and his brother had obtained their jobs through the influence of Leader Thomas Foley and Assemblyman Peter Hamill of the Second Assembly District.

When Santo was arrested in his home at 35 Madison street, 700 ounces of cocaine were seized with a peddling value of between \$25,000 and \$40,000. In the prisoner's possession was found a book of addresses which led to the arrest of twelve persons in this city, Albany, Saratoga and Syracuse, all of whom were alleged to be drug agents of the young Italian.

John Pallieri, a safe owner at 42 Monroe street, a close friend of the Parisi brothers, was shot and killed on August 29, when Frank was close at hand. It is believed by the police that the same murderers killed Frank Parisi because he had been talking too much about the crime and was about to give information to the police.

Levy, Magistrate, will conduct the ceremonies and the speakers will include Mrs. William Jacobus, president of the institution, Mayor Faubus of Yonkers, Dr. Nathan Kress, Nathan Straus, Mark Eisner, and Mrs. Sally Glauher, president of the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods. Mr. B. B. Greller will deliver the opening address. Dr. Aaron Eisenman will assist in the exercises.

The Shelter was organized in 1919 to provide temporary care for orphan, homeless and friendless children during delays in investigation of the merits of their cases. A building and grounds costing \$50,000 have been purchased.
