

Six Passenger Steamships Out To-day for Europe

Memory Wreaths for War Dead Abroad—Among the Passengers.

When the George Washington of the United States Lines goes out to-day she will be the center of a noisy marine demonstration. Torpedo boats will escort the steamship down the bay and a police boat will represent the city government in the honors to be accorded to the liner because on board will be Thomas Fields, Senior National Vice-Commander of the National Disabled Soldiers League.

Mr. Fields is taking several wreaths, one of which will be placed on the tomb of the French unknown soldier in Paris on Armistice Day. Others will be laid on the graves of American soldiers who sleep in France. Another will be dropped aboard of Plymouth in memory of the men who lost their lives in the sinking of the coast guard cutter Tamara. Disabled soldiers from New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York and other Eastern States, to the number of several hundred, will be at the pier to wish "bon voyage" to Mr. Fields. A flag designed by the National Disabled Soldiers League will fly from one of the masts. Mme. Cecile Sorel, leading woman of the Comedie Francaise of Paris, who has been appearing in Canada recently, will present a repertoire of plays in New York for the week beginning November 13, supported by a company drawn from the Comedie Francaise and other leading Paris theaters. The tour, which will probably include one or two other cities, has the sanction of the Minister of Beaux Arts of France.

The New York engagement, which will be played under the direction of the Shuberts, is due largely to the efforts of Augustus Thoms, who made the arrangement with the French government. The last time such permission was granted was when Coquelin brought a company to America in 1897. In making the announcement yesterday, Lee Shubert said that the theater at which Mme. Sorel and her company are to appear had not been selected.

The other members of the company are Fernand Chapin of the Theatre des Champs Elysees, Rene Bernier of the Theatre des Vieux Colombes, and the Comedie Francaise, and the New York engagement are "L'Avanture" by Emile Augier; "Le Demi-Monde" and "La Dame aux Camellias," by Alexandre Dumas; "Le Misanthrope," by Moliere, and a French version of "The Taming of the Shrew," given under the title of "La Megere Approuvee." It is expected that at least three other plays equally famous but of contrasting character will be offered.
