Frederick Charles Shaw, British army, in the American Church, Rue de Berri, this morning in the presence of only a few intimate friends and members of their families.

The bride wore a simple frock of gray crepe de chine, a felt hat and gray shoes. Capt. Shaw, who has been residing on his estate in East Africa since the war, will take Mrs. Shaw there in a few months.

Friends of Mrs. Sewall of New York, whose divorce from Mr. William Gilman Sewall in France was announced recently, learned only last Sunday through The New York Herald of her new romance. Her engagement to Capt. Shaw became known to the families soon after Mrs. Sewall obtained her decree.

The bride is the youngest of the daughters of the late Ricardo and Michaela Hernandez de Alba de Acosta. Her sisters are Mrs. Rita de Acosta Lydig, Mrs. Oren Root, Jr.; Mrs. Andrew Robeson Sargent and Mrs. Abram Poole. She was married to Mr. Sewall November 12, 1919. For some time her husband has been at 59 Avenue Marceau, Paris.

Capt. Shaw is 27 and the second of six children of Sir Frederic and Lady Shaw. His mother was Eleanor Hester, daughter of Mr. F. de Vere of the British army. YALE'S 885 FRESHMEN COME FROM 22 SCHOOLS. Record Class Supplied by 42 States, Four Foreign Lands.

NEW HAVEN, Nov. 6.—An analysis of the Yale undergraduates of the freshman class, which with its 885 members is the largest class in the history of the university, shows a wide distribution geographically and with respect to preparatory schools. Forty-two States, four foreign countries and twenty-two different preparatory schools are represented.

Of the 885 enrolled 216 entered the university from public high schools and 354 from private schools, 88 having prepared at both high and private schools, and 62 at tutoring schools. The remainder entered as transfers from other preparatory schools.

As to preparatory schools the distribution was as follows: New Haven High School, 91; Phillips Andover Academy, 69; Hotchkiss School, 53; Phillips Exeter Academy, 45; St. Paul's School, Concord, N. H.; Taft School, 33; Hill School, 27; Choate School, 22; Lawrenceville School, 12; Hotchkiss School, 11, and Groton School, 10. There were also from the University School of Cleveland, Worcester Grammar School, Loomis Institute, Canterbury, Lake Placid and Central High School of Washington, D. C.

GEN. I. A. BARBOUR DIES. Former Bank President Had Been Ill for a Year.

Special Dispatch to The New York Herald. HARTFORD, Nov. 6.—Gen. Lucius A. Barbour, aged 76, for many years president in Connecticut military affairs, died today in his home, 120 Washington street, of heart disease. He had been ill for a year.

He was born in Madison, Ind. In 1854 he was elected adjutant general and treasurer of the William Linn Company, continuing there until that concern became part of the American National Bank. He was elected president of the Charter Oak National Bank and continued as president until the bank was merged with the Phoenix National Bank in 1905.

He was a director of the National Fire Insurance Company and of Landers, Frary and Clark of New Britain, Conn. He was a member of the national guard in 1865. He was appointed a Colonel in 1878. He was appointed Adjutant-General by Gov. Bulkeley. He was a member of the Brig-Gen. Lucius B. Barbour and Mrs. Harriet B. Phelps, and one sister, Mrs. Richard S. Barnes of New York.

MRS. MACDERMOTT'S SUIT IS TRANSFERRED. Action Against Actor-Husband Will Be Heard Here.

The suit for separation which Mrs. Miriam Nesbitt MacDermott started in Rochester county Supreme Court against Marc MacDermott, motion picture actor and vaudeville performer, has been transferred to New York county. Mrs. MacDermott seeks \$10,000 a year alimony and \$5,000 counsel fees.
