

**CARLTON ASKS U. S. TO DEPORT SOMERSET**

Edith Day's Husband Makes Charges Against Co-respondent in Suit.

**PRODUCES BAD CHECKS**

Says He Spent \$20,000 in Getting Evidence in England.

**INVOKES MORALITY BAR**

Charges Other Man Wanted Actress to Be His 'Meal Ticket.'

Carle Carlton, husband of Miss Edith Day, a widely known musical comedy actress and now the star of "Orange Blossoms," who has named Pat Somerset, an English actor, as co-respondent in his suit for divorce, appeared before a Special Board of Inquiry at Ellis Island yesterday in an effort to have Somerset deported as an undesirable alien. Carlton offered in evidence forty-seven alleged worthless checks which Somerset is said to have passed in England, as well as depositions from various persons denouncing the actor's moral character. At the request of Somerset's attorneys, however, the case was adjourned until next Monday.

Carlton, in a statement to reporters after the hearing had adjourned, declared he had spent more than \$20,000 getting evidence against Somerset and his wife, but said at the same time he did not feel any animosity toward Miss Day.

"She is a wonderful woman," he said. "and I would do anything for her. But I do not intend to let her keep a meal ticket like Somerset hanging around for me to support."

**London Depositions.**

In support of his contention that Somerset should be deported as an undesirable alien, Carlton submitted depositions taken before Richard P. Sherman, a United States Commissioner, in London during June, 1921, having to do with the alleged intimacy of Miss Day and Somerset. The first of these was by a woman named Annie Dunn, a dresser for Miss Day. She declared that Somerset had frequently visited Miss Day at a London hotel where she, Miss Dunn, was working at the time. Similar depositions were submitted from Winifred Holland, a maid at the Torbay Hotel, and John Sarakis, a hall porter in the Hotel Torbay. He declared that Somerset and Miss Day had registered at the hotel as Mr. and Mrs. Somerset.

The marital troubles of Carlton and his wife have been before the public for some time. Carlton produced "Irene" originally, and it was in that musical play that Miss Day had her first big success. During the run of the piece in London she began to be interested in Somerset. Carlton declares, and soon he began to suspect that he was being deceived. He said yesterday that he married Miss Day at her own suggestion after she had become a star, and that he didn't think much of the idea of marriage at the time.

Carlton repeated that he could stand a whole lot, but not a "meal ticket like Somerset." He told Miss Day that what she was doing was wrong, but she refused to listen, even though he told her that Somerset had sponged off many women in Europe. He declared also that Somerset and Miss Day pawned her jewels, which Carlton had given her, and spent the money together.

**HOMESEAKER ARRESTED IN \$800 DIAMOND THEFT**

Two Accuse Woman of Having Victimized Them.

Mrs. Katherine Flunn, of 128 West Eighty-fifth street, was locked up last night in the Fort Hamilton station in Brooklyn, charged with grand larceny.

The police said she was identified by Mrs. Mary E. Breen, of 6806 Sixth avenue, and Mrs. Gladys Porter, 149 Monroe street, both of Brooklyn, as a woman who had victimized them.

Mrs. Breen charges that Mrs. Flunn called to buy the Breen home, which had been advertised for sale, and was left alone in a room to "measure it to see if her furniture would fit." A few minutes later Mrs. Breen missed diamond rings worth \$800. Mrs. Porter said that Mrs. Flunn victimized her while she was living in Eighty-second street, Brooklyn.

**CHURCH WOULD HELP NEAR EAST REFUGEES**

Episcopal Council Says Lift Bars at Ellis Island.

The National Council of the Episcopal Church has urged the Secretary of Labor to admit to the country on bond 1,000 Greek and Armenian refugees from the Near East who arrived at Ellis Island a few days ago. They have been threatened with deportation because the immigration quotas from the countries whence they came have been reached. The National Council suggests that they be charged off against next year's quotas.

"Christian America," the message reads, "cannot send women and children coming to relatives back to Turkish misrule in Constantinople and Smyrna, or to poverty stricken Greece."
