New York, Nov. 8. (Herald Bureau.) Paul Samson Koerner, known around Fourteenth street and Third avenue in New York, as just plain Paul Samson, stepped from the stockhold of the Reliance into the heavyweight championship of Germany to-night.

Paul Samson Koerner, the native titleholder, in the ninth round of what was to have been a fifteen round fight.

Paul bounced the blond Teuton off the canvas four times before giving him his sleeping potion, which was dealt out in the form of a left hook that fairly cracked with persuasion.

It was fifteen minutes later before Herr Hans Breitenstraetter awoke to the fact that Paul Samson Koerner of Fourteenth street and Third avenue, New York, was the new heavyweight champion of Germany.

Berlin sporting circles are agog over this new champion from America and Berlin boxing fans are in the slough of despond.

Hans Wagner Challenge. While Berlin talks dejectedly and Hans Wagner—no nation known as King—wags in other sport—shouts defiance at the new champion from America and vows to save Teutonia from this new disgrace.

Samson Koerner is busy preparing to fight back to Fourteenth street and Third avenue and knocked Germany's dream of world supremacy with gloves into a cocked hat.
