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**CHILDERS'S COUNSEL ATTACKS IRISH LAWS**

Says Government Cannot Act Because London Treaty Is Not Ratified.

The fate of Erskine Childers, charged with unlawful possession of arms, still hangs in the balance. Michael Conyns, attorney for Childers, spent the day in arguing on the motion for habeas corpus before Master of the Rolls O'Connor, after which adjournment was taken until to-morrow to give counsel an opportunity of submitting further argument.

Counsel for Childers argued that the imperial restoration of order act was still in force in Ireland and that the action by the Government in empowering military tribunals had no legal validity, that the Anglo-Irish treaty is not yet law and that therefore the Government cannot act under it.

Hugh Kennedy, counsel for the provisional government, termed Childers an Englishman, to which Conyns objected, saying his client was not an Englishman, but an Irish citizen; his mother was an Irish woman, he made his home in Ireland and was happy to make the supreme sacrifice for the land he loved.

While Free State officials still insist that there will be no mitigation of the sentence, which Conyns described as "the last supreme sacrifice," the feeling is growing that the delays which have taken place may result in changing the supposed death sentence to long imprisonment or deportation.

A rumor was circulated that Childers was already on the way to Ascension Island in the South Atlantic, but this is untrue. It is not unlikely that he is confined on some island in Dublin Bay which may thus be nicknamed.

**ARTIFICIAL EARTH SHOCKS TO ROCK CENTRAL EUROPE**

Two Explosions, Each as Violent as That Which Wrecked Oppau, Will Be Carried Out by Scientists of Goettingen University to Study Phenomena.

All of Germany, France, Holland, Switzerland and Czecho-Slovakia will be rocked Friday and Saturday nights by a succession of man made earthquakes. Two earth tremors, each of which will be as violent as the explosion which wrecked Oppau last year and killed nearly 1,000 people, will be created for the scientific purpose of studying the influence of earthquakes, particularly in the so-called zones of silence.

Sismographs and other instruments have been placed at various points, ready to record every phase of the disturbances. The difficulty in making calculations in earthquakes heretofore has been the gauging of distance and intensity. These experiments with both quantities known will enable scientists to figure backward and secure a formula for working out unshakable tremors. Another phenomenon to be observed will be the zones of silence. It is known that in a zone of thirty miles radius an explosion is heard, in the next zone it is not heard, while in the following zone it is again heard plainly.

The artificial earthquakes will be set off near Heidelberg in the Rhoen Mountains, near the scene of the recent glider meet on the Prussia-Bavarian border. Thousands of tons of explosives will be touched off on the 3,000 foot summit of one of the highest hills of the range. Preparations for the explosion are being carried out by the geographical department of Goettingen University, the money being supplied by the Lindenburg endowment fund for scientific experiments along this line.

The idea of homemade earthquakes was gained from the incomplete observations at the time of the Oppau explosion, which did not permit of a scientific analysis, as it was unexpected and no preparations were made to measure the wind velocities and other necessary facts.

A similar artificial explosion was recently set off in Holland, at which time the tremors were observed and photographed as far away as a certain village in Surrey, about thirty miles from London.

Archivists has elected Grand Duke Nicholas, former Commander in Chief of the Russian army, successor to the "throne" of the late Czar Nicholas by 55 votes to 5. The headquarters of the council will be removed from Berlin to Paris because of the growing strength of the Bolsheviki in Berlin.

**CUNO CABINET HOLDS FIRM ON REPARATION**

Its Program Likely to Be Based on Wirth Note to Allies.

Berlin, Nov. 22 (Associated Press).—Chancellor Cuno took over the reins of Government to-day and conducted informal conferences with his Ministers. No reply has yet been received from Dr. von Rosenberg, named for the Foreign portfolio, but Rudolph Oeser, Democratic leader, has accepted the post of Minister of the Interior. On Friday the Council will read the Government's program in the Reichstag, followed on Saturday by the customary partisan discussions, upon the temper of which will depend whether Herr Cuno will ask for a vote of confidence.

Indications to-night point to the probability that the new Government's program will be widely based on the last Ministry's note to the Reparations Commission, inasmuch as this program received the approval of the former coalition parties and the German People's party. It is not improbable that the new Cabinet will dispense with the formality of asking for a vote of confidence.
