8,000 BRICKLAYERS OUT WORK MONDAY

Masons' Unions Refuse Plea of Employers to Man 'Struck' Jobs.

BACKING IS PROMISED Workers Threaten to Call Out Other Trades if Necessary.

EMPLOYERS ARE DEFIANT Reiterate That All Brick Work in City Will Be Stopped if Walkout Occurs.

New York city will find all brickwork stopped on Monday, its 8,000 bricklayers locked out and a corresponding tieup of new construction.

Virtually the last chance for peace was removed at a meeting of the executive committee of the masons' unions in Black Eagle Hall, Third avenue and East Eighty-sixth street.

When notified of the action taken by the employers Walter V. Price, spokesman for the union leaders, said: "We won't back down. We'll go through with it, and go through it alone, too, unless later we have to call on the other trades. It takes a long time for a bricklayer to start a fight, but when he's in it he sticks."

At a meeting at the employers' association headquarters, 30 West Thirty-third street, resolutions had been adopted, that charged the bricklayers with calling strikes in violation of an agreement, with the object of forcing the employers into a break with the independent hodcarriers.
