

FOUR STUDENTS DIE IN SEMINARY FIRE

Four Missing, 20 Injured,
When St. Boniface, Winni-
peg, Is Destroyed.

WINNIPEG, Man., Nov. 25.—Four students were burned to death, four are missing and twenty others were injured in a fire which destroyed St. Boniface College early this morning. Four bodies have been recovered but not identified. St. Boniface College was the oldest and most noted of Canadian Catholic institutions. The famous Jesuit library was also destroyed.

One hundred and sixty students and forty adults were asleep. Many of the injured received broken limbs and bruises by jumping from windows. The college was founded in 1818.

when Father Provencher, afterward appointed first Bishop of St. Boniface, came to the Red River settlement and opened a school in a small hut.

In 1855 the college was erected and some years later the building destroyed 10-day took it place. It was four stories high.

In 1885 its direction was handed over to the Fathers of the Society of Jesus, by whom it was conducted. It was affiliated with the University of Manitoba.

Dr. Haywood assured Canon Chase yesterday that the Klan was a law abiding, God fearing, country loving organization that would not tolerate persons within its ranks of any lawless

character. Canon Chase said that he neither condemned nor praised the Klan. Otto H. Stiefel, president of the Steuben Society of America, which has incurred the wrath of the Klanmen in Paterson, N. J., said last night that he placed the Klan in the category of the Italian Camorra. He added:

"It is not necessary to reply to these outlaws. The creed of the Steuben Society is 'One Country, One Flag, One Language. One country so fair and just and generous that all who live in it may love it'—one flag, the American flag for American purposes; one language, the language of truth spoken in any tongue one chooses to speak the truth."

**PATERSON OFFICIALS
KNOW NOTHING OF KLAN**

Grand Jury Not to Act in Absence of Overt Act.

*Reports that a Passaic county, N. J., Grand Jury is about to investigate the Paterson Chapter of the Ku Klux Klan caused J. Willard De Yoe, County Prosecutor, to say yesterday that there is no

official knowledge of the Klan in Paterson and that therefore no action is under consideration. Mr. De Yoe and John Tracey, Chief of Police of Paterson, said there had been no complaints to them against the order. Both asserted, however, that if the Klan overstepped the bounds of law and order it would be repressed.

Following the publication of a letter that the Paterson Klan intends to rid the city of alleged German propagandists and radicals Rabbi Max Raisin of Barnert Memorial Temple deplored the strength of the order in Paterson. He said:

"This nation cannot live if it become half American and half Ku Klux Klan."

**ASKS BURNS TO TELL
CONGRESS OF THE KLAN**

**Representative Rainey Wants
Full Inquiry Made.**

Declaring "the time has come for public officials to uphold their oath of office

and tear the masks from the faces and expose those who are seeking to usurp the authority of our Government," Representative John W. Rainey (Dem., Ill.) announced today that he would ask William J. Burns, chief of the bureau of investigation of the Department of Justice to furnish to Congress any information he has regarding the activities of the Ku Klux Klan here.

Mr. Burns has some interesting facts and if called upon to do so he will make them public. He can refute the assertion of the heads of the invisible empire that their organization is a harmless, amiable body of men banded together to enforce the law.

Upon the request of Mr. Rainey Mr. Burns will inquire into initiation ceremonies reported to have been held by a local Klan in the Capitol and similar performances in executive buildings.

There is a belief at the Capitol that Mr. Burns may uncover something if he has an opportunity to open up freely on the Ku Klux Klan and its relation to certain Congressmen. Mr. Burns has had secret service men investigate the assertion that fourteen or more members of the House and two Senators are members of the Klan.

**CLERGYMAN ORGANIZES
KLAN AT MIDDLETOWN**

**'Klokard, Says He Is Mason
and Knight Templar.**

MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., Nov. 25.—A local branch of the Ku Klux Klan is being formed. The Rev. Dr. Sam P. Campbell, one of the Klokards, or lecturers, addressed 100 citizens and nearly all of them filled out membership application cards. Dr. Campbell said he was a Mason, a Knight Templar and a Shriner and told his hearers that whereas in other organizations "the candidates are hoodwinked, we are masked to give our candidates a chance to see what is done while the members are being hoodwinked."

E. D. Smith, Grand Dragon of the Realm of New York State, attended the meeting, saying that he was merely here on his way from Buffalo to New York. There seems to be no doubt that Middletown will have quite a Klan.
