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WETS DECLARE NEW CONGRESS FOR BEER

Assert Poll Shows Amendment of Volstead Law Certain.

COUNT ON 'SILENT VOTE' ACTIVE IN MANY LINES

Claim Gains in House Sufficient to Swing 'Non-Committals.'

Modification of the Volstead act by the next Congress to permit the manufacture and sale of light wine and beer was predicted in a statement to-night by the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment.

While the statement issued from headquarters of the association in the name of Capt. W. H. Stuyvesant, its founder, admits that the strength disclosed by the poll is not sufficient in itself to change the law, it claims that it would nevertheless constitute a sufficiently strong nucleus to swing the tide of liberal control.

The poll recently made by THE NEW YORK HERALD is not as promising for the modification forces as the poll of the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment.

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W.M. G. ROCKEFELLER DIES OF PNEUMONIA

Son of William Rockefeller Succumbs Five Months After His Father.

WILLIAM G. ROCKEFELLER, a son of the late William Rockefeller and a nephew of John D. Rockefeller, died of pneumonia last night at his home in 292 Madison avenue.

Physicians were called immediately, but Mr. Rockefeller's illness developed into pneumonia within a short time. His father died of a similar illness last June.

Mr. Rockefeller was not so well known in financial circles as some of the other members of the family, but he was a director in many corporations and conducted financial operations of considerable magnitude from his office at 26 Broadway.

Married Stillman's Daughter. Mr. Rockefeller was the oldest of the four children of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Rockefeller.

He was born in 1870 and was graduated from Yale in 1892. Four years later he married Miss S. Elsie Stillman, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Stillman.

His younger brother, Percy Avery Rockefeller, in 1901 married another daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stillman.

The sisters of Mr. Rockefeller are Mrs. D. Hunter McAlpin and Mrs. Marcellus Hartley Dodge.

Mr. Rockefeller's marriage to Miss Stillman was one of the notable events of the 90's, among those present being Mr. and Mrs. William C. Whitney, J. Pierpont Morgan, Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt, Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Wilson, Mr. and Mrs. John Jacob Astor, the Ogden Goeletts and many other almost equally notable as among the wealthiest families of America.
