ANTI-BONUS LEAGUE TO POLL VETERANS

Urges Fordney to Abide by Wishes Men Express on Gratuity.

WARNING VERY CLEAR

Opposition to Be Vigorous if Sponsor Tries to Force Gift Bill.

LEGION LOSING MEMBERS

E. L. Allen Tells How Quiz of Proposed Beneficiaries Condemns Plan.

Edward L. Allen, chairman of the board of trustees of the Ex-Service Men's Anti-Bonus League, Inc., of 19 West Forty-fourth street, made public last night a letter he has sent to Representative Joseph W. Fordney, chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, dealing with the avowed intention of Mr. Fordney again to introduce the bonus bill in Congress.

Makes Position Clear.

Mr. Allen, in his letter, goes on to say: "To make clear our position in the matter, Mr. Fordney, we wish you to know that we are convinced of your absolute sincerity in the efforts you have made and are making to do something for the boys who offered their all on the altar of sacrifice that democracy might live."

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The Union, it nevertheless has sounded the sentiment of ex-service men throughout the nation on the bonus issue and we can state with the utmost assurance that it is not true that a majority of the able-bodied veterans want a bonus. In fact we are convinced that quite the reverse is true; that not under any circumstance would a majority of the veterans of the world war seek or expect from the Government any kind of a bonus or compensation.

Mr. Fordney is not hesitating within the last three days to express his willingness to cooperate with the leaders of the conservative and moderately liberal wings of the President's party in an effort to produce a program less refractory than that which dictated the achievements during the last two years in Congress.

Mr. Borah is more than willing to meet the President and his supporters half way to repair the damage done by the Mondells, the McCumbers, the Fordneys and the other irreconcilable reactionaries, who either ignored or defied the views of the President and the persistently expanding wave of popular resentment which culminated in the rebuke of the Republican party a month ago.

There appears to be little question in the minds of men who have talked with the President that he will no longer view with placid amiability Congressional ventures promoted by the repudiated "lame duck" elements, whose injudicious judgment of popular conditions so nearly cost the President's party the control of the two houses of Congress.

The "advanced views" of Mr. Harding—as his more recent opinions are described by some of his critics—have already made an unmistakable impression upon the vast majority of the members of Congress.

A larger number of Senators and Representatives have endorsed the new program advocated by the President to solve political, social and economic problems than was the case three or four months ago.

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made by the President in his address Friday beyond the adoption of preliminaries, which are expected to produce in concrete form a program to be followed by the present Congress.

Whether the President will be able to induce the Senate to pass the subsidy bill is problematic. The Senate does not want to pass it, in which respect dominant sentiment in that body nicely synchronizes with popular judgment.

The elimination of the ship subsidy bill would permit the President to demand with reasonable justification the enactment without delay of the appropriation bills and one or two projects for the relief of agricultural conditions during the remaining three months of the present Congress.

The President may succeed in forcing his shipping bill through, but it is quite obvious to even his most ardent supporters that he cannot hope to do so without damage to his other plans.

Other Point of Issue.

The other point of issue between the President and Congress revolves around the one commendable suggestion made by the La Follette conference. This was that the Constitution should be amended to move the convening of a new Congress from December back to January or within two months of a general election instead of delaying it for thirteen months as at present.
