

Count de Prorok to Wed Daughter of W. F. Kenny

Miss Alice Kenny Will Be Bride of Archeologist in February.

Mr. and Mrs. William Francis Kenny gave a tea at their home, 820 Fifth avenue, yesterday when their party was complete informed their guests of the engagement of their daughter, Miss Alice Josephine Kenny, to Count Byron Kuhn de Prorok, archeologist, author and artist, who arrived here recently after having carried on extensive exploratory work in the ruins of Carthage. The wedding will take place in February.

Miss Kenny is the oldest of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. Kenny, who lived in Brooklyn several years before moving to their present home. She was educated at the Marymount School in Home and at the Finch School in this city. She made her debut last year and has since passed much of her time abroad. Her father has extensive business interests in New York and is associated with Mr. Nicholas P. Brady.

Count de Prorok is a member of a Polish family. His father is dead. His mother lives in Paris. His sister is Mrs. Borden Covel of Brookline, Mass. He is a member of the French Government to explore the ruins of Carthage. He is delivering a series of lectures on his expedition to Carthage, in which he gave December 17 in the Museum of French Art at 593 Fifth avenue. He brought with him with the permission of the French Government a large collection of relics found in the ruins of Carthage. He was a guest while in New York of Prof. Henry Fairfield Osborn at the latter's country home at Garrison, N. Y. He is striving to raise money here for his further explorations at Carthage.
