REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION.

A delegate convention of the Republicans of Sedgewick county will be held at the city of Wichita, Kansas, on Wednesday, July 2, next, at 10 o'clock a. m. for the purpose of electing delegates to the national convention.
