PROCEEDINGS OF THE DEMOCRATIC SENATORIAL CONVENTION

Which Was Held at the Court Room in This City Yesterday.

ED. DORSEY NOMINATED FOR STATE SENATOR ON THE FIRST BALLOT.

The Convention Favored Reubmission, and Endorsed the State and National Ticket.

The Democratic Senatorial convention for the thirty-third district, convened at the court house in this city yesterday forenoon at 10:30 o'clock.

On motion, the chair was instructed to appoint a committee of three on permanent organization, a committee of five on resolutions, the same on credentials, and a committee of three on order of business.

On permanent organization—C. F. Derby, H. F. Jones and John W. Wingard.

On resolutions—Chas. Duncan, Sam Major, Howard Sowie, Geo. Thomas and S. Baker.

On credentials—M. G. Jones, Geo. Byers, Joseph Knobloch, Wm. Hayes and G. A. McKinstry.

On order of business—P. V. Healey, Oscar Smith and A. O. Tompkins.

The convention adjourned until 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The convention reassembled promptly at 2 o'clock in the court room.

On motion, the chair was instructed to order the committee on permanent organization reported in favor of Ed. Dorsey for chairman, and Sam Major secretary, which report was adopted.

The committee on credentials reported the following delegates entitled to seats in the convention:

Sedgewick county—Oscar Smith, A. H. McKee, M. G. Jones, George Byers, Chas. Duncan, John Fisher, Samuel Major, Thos. Odell, Howard Sowie, Cyrus Willis, John Derby, P. V. Healey, Henry Jones, John Ratcliff, Joseph Knobloch, C. A. Allen, Ben Aldrich, J. McCarry and M. Barr.

Kingman county—S. S. Baker, Hurt Venable, Wm. Hayes, George A. McKinstry, A. O. Yeoman, James E. Wingard and Geo. Thomas.

The committee on order of business reported the usual routine.

Nominations being in order, Sam Major arose and in a few timely words placed before the convention the name of S. G. Babcock, of Kingman county.

John Fisher then introduced Ed. Dorsey, pronouncing a very handsome eulogy on him as a man of honor and a good citizen, etc.

Balancing then followed, the first vote resulting in the election of Ed. Dorsey by a vote of fourteen to twenty.

The committee appointed for that purpose submitted a resolution endorsing the state and national Democratic ticket and favoring reubmission, which was adopted.

P. V. Healey offered a resolution endorsing the nomination of the convention in case of election to cast his vote against John J. Ingalls for U. S. senator, but the resolution was lost.

There being no other business before the convention it adjourned.

Immediately after adjournment one of the delegates proposed three cheers for Hon. John Kelly, but the average delegate was too drowsy to respond to a certain proposition whatever, and the crowd dispersed, the air being full of oaths over the results of the convention.
