WAGE WARRIORS

Starting from one man's Grievances, the Strike Has Now

Extended to the Entire Gould Systems of Railroads.

The Strike is made by Order of the Knights of Labor, and for the Reason,

As Alleged, That the Receivers of the Texas and Pacific Roads Have Failed to Comply With

The Terms of an Agreement Made Several Months Ago as to Discharging Employees.

Railroad Operatives Out.

SENECA, Mo., March 6.—The Missouri Pacific and Missouri, Kansas and Texas shopped struck at 10:30 to-day. All is chaos and it is impossible to find out but little. It is supposed that the order came from Texas. It is reported that every man but one in the shops here belong to the Knights of Labor and he was discharged from work.

St. Louis, March 6.—All Knights of Labor employed at the shops in this city, of the Gould system, struck this morning. This action was taken as a means to force the railroad to accede to the demands of the strikers. The strikers recently ceased work because, as they state, one of their number was discharged without cause.

The strike here was inaugurated at 12:30 p. m. on orders from the Knights of Labor at Marshall, Texas. The men, about 600 in number, simply left their work. This number includes shop men, section hands, wipers and other employes about the round house. The strikers held an enthusiastic meeting at Smith's opera house, which was largely attended. The meeting adopted a committee, with Fred Page, chairman, and Harry Kiley, secretary.

Two freight engines were killed at 11 a. m. which were to take train No. 100, bound for Texas. The train was abandoned.

A freight train left for Kansas City at 8:30 p. m. under the permission of the strikers. The train was principally perishable freight. The outlook is not very favorable for an early settlement of the pending difficulties. The officers are very reticent as to what tactics they will employ, and the men are still silent as to their future movements.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., March 6.—As yet there is no movement going on the part of the Knights of Labor at the railroad shops in this city, and no one is expected by the authorities in charge.

GALVESTON, March 6.—Knights at the Gulf and Colorado and Santa Fe freight depot refused to handle Mallory freight, and were replaced this morning by colored laborers. At the Missouri Pacific freight depot, the strikers observed the boycott and none were discharged. Both companies have a number of colored men selected with a view of replacing the Knights as fast as they depart. Such changes will be permanent.

Running a general strike of the Knights throughout Texas are current here. Indications point to an understanding on the part of the Knights to meet on Monday morning on roads carrying Mallory freight.

There is considerable dissatisfaction among the local Knights, especially those employed in the great compress establishment.

Master Workman Gordon, of this (8th district) assembly of Knights of Labor, has been impeached for violating a pledge to refrain from liquor, and he succeeded by Wm. Farro, of Minley, Texas.

KANSAS CITY, March 6.—The men in the Missouri Pacific freight shops at this place, stopping business in the yards. About forty men have gone out and there is no freight train in the yard.

The Missouri Pacific repair shops and round house men also went out, making in all about 175 men. No freight trains are running as yet. All attempts to gain information from the railroad are unavailing. The strikers are in secret council to-night.

LYNN, Rock, March 6.—Trouble with operatives of the Texas and Pacific railroad has extended to Little Rock. To-day all workmen in the St. Louis and Little Rock mountain railroad machine shops, over three hundred, stopped work and business is at a standstill. All quiet and orderly.

ST. LOUIS, March 6.—A telegram was received from Seneca this morning stating that 700 employes of the Missouri Pacific company at that place have struck. This statement caused great alarm, as it is supposed to be the inaugural step for a general strike of the Gould system, contemplated by the Knights of Labor.

ST. LOUIS, March 6.—Direct application has been made to the receiver of the Missouri Pacific system, as possibly as possible in anticipation of a strike. An assistant press reporter interviewed a union member who stated that the strikers were equipped and prepared for a strike. They say they are not afraid of the strikers, but ordered here it will be a movement in sympathy with the strike on the Texas Pacific. There are about 250 shop hands employed here.

Frederick is heard from the governor before Monday men will be then ordered out. They will come the engineers and firemen and conductors. They do not belong to us, but we can help them out. But we think they have gone for enough to show the Texas and Pacific receivers what they have to deal with, and it is only a matter of time before they will be ordered out.

The Globe-Democrat's Seneca special says that of the men who struck there, 100 from the shops of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas, and 100 from the shops of the Missouri Pacific. At a meeting of the Knights held this noon committee were appointed to look after the property of the company, and to see that all passenger engines are ready for work, but on arrival of freight trains the cars will be tracked and the locomotives taken to the round house and "killed." Fred Page, a prominent member of the district association 101, and chairman of the meeting held to-night, says all train and bridge men will co-operate with the strikers but it is not known what track men and section men will do.

Engineers held a special meeting this afternoon, but nothing is known of their proceedings. Conductor King, who passed through here this afternoon in charge of the Missouri Pacific passenger, said that Gov. Mandrake came from St. Louis to Jefferson City with him and was emphatic in his declaration that he would not allow the Missouri Pacific officials in their present trouble. He claims that Vice-President Hoxie has lived up to contract entered into a year ago with the Knights of Labor, and says the latter have no cause for strikes. The governor was anxious that information should be conveyed to the strikers and said that should the trouble continue he would probably visit Seneca.

At the freight depot nothing whatever is doing, and from the fact that General Superintendent Shiloh is making no attempt to send out freight trains it is thought the company will pursue the policy of abandoning all trains and suspend business in every department except passenger traffic.

The Globe-Democrat's Palestine special says 250 International and Great Northern shop men quit work in obedience to orders from headquarters of the Knights of Labor. The company will not attempt to run any except passenger trains.

The Knights of Labor, and more particularly the railroad branch of that order, have been in pretty continuous and secret session all day and to-night. Their proceedings are not known, but one of the speakers at the meeting in his position in the car shops at it is their intention to stop every wheel on the Gould system to C. A. Hall is well related in his position in the car shops at Marshall. The executive committee, he added, is pretty certain that Gov. Brown, receiver of the Texas and Pacific, will yield
