KING OF FINANCE HAS ABDICATED

Does Obedience Before Throne of the Grim Reaper and Goes the Way of All Flesh.

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, May 26.—Baron Alphonz de Rothschild, head of the French branch of the banking house bearing the name of Rothschild, and governor of the Bank of France, died at 4:30 this morning from bronchitis, aggravated by gout. The eminent financier had been sinking slowly for many days, but there

was no apprehension that his death was imminent. He passed peacefully away this morning, surrounded by his family. The announcement of the baron's death caused wide-spread regret, for, besides his position in the financial world, Baron Alphonz was known for his lavish charities, one of the latest being the gift of \$2,000,000 for the erection of workmen's homes.

The deceased was born in 1827 and will be succeeded as head of the Paris banking house by Baron Lambert de Rothschild, of Brussels, whose business capacity has earned him a world-wide reputation. The burial of Baron Alphonz will be most simple, according to the strict rule of the Rothschild family, including a plain coffin, without mourning tributes. The funeral, the date of which has not been fixed, will be the occasion of a notable tribute of respect.

Baron Alphonz leaves two children, Boran Edouard and Baroness Beatrix. He has two surviving brothers, Baron Gustav and Baron Edmond.

SOUTHERN ENGINE MAKES RECORD RUN

Forty-Four Miles in Thirty-Five Minutes. Taking Man to Bedside of Sick Wife.

(By Associated Press.) HUNTSVILLE, ALA., May 26.—An engine and caboose, with Engineer Charles Porter at the throttle, has made the distance from Tusculumbia to Decatur, on the Memphis division of the Southern Railway, forty-four miles, in thirty-five minutes. This run is reported to be the fastest time ever made over the Southern.

A resident of Decatur was the only passenger, having chartered the train to hurry to the bedside of his sick wife.

GOOD JOB FOR CARSON.

Newspaper Man to Be Appointed Chief Bureau of Manufacturers.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., May 26.—Major John Carson, Washington representative of the New York Times, and Philadelphia Public Ledger, will probably be appointed chief of the bureau of manufacturers, department of Commerce and Labor, to succeed J. Hampton Moore, who has resigned to accept the presidency of a Philadelphia trust company. Major Carson is chairman of the standing committee of Washington correspondents.

SQUADRON BACK AT OLD POINT

Battleships Maine, Missouri, Kearsarge and Kentucky Return From Cruise on Ocean.

After a four-day's cruise on the Atlantic ocean off the Virginia Capes, the first division of the battleship squadron, composed of the battleships Maine, Missouri, Kearsarge and Kentucky, commanded by Rear Admiral Robely D. Evans, returned to Hampton Roads yesterday morning. The ships will sail northward from Old Point about June 5.

The squadron will rendezvous at Provincetown, Mass., about July 1. The ships will then have been repaired and overhauled and will standardize their screws. This will be followed by a full powered steam trial under forced draught for four or eight hours. After the speed trial the squadron will engage in drills and evolutions at the Southern drill grounds off Cape Henry until about July 25, when the ships will be sent to New York and Boston, where the men will be given liberty. About the middle of August the ships will return to the drill grounds off Cape Henry for further work.

BROKE INTO CASINO.

Unknown Thieves Carried Off Eleven Valuable Shot Guns.

The Casino theater was broken into some time Thursday night and eleven valuable shot guns, belonging to J. C. Eldridge, a traveling salesman, were carried off. Mr. Eldridge was stopping at Hotel Warwick and, as all of the hotel's sample rooms were in use, he was given the privilege of displaying his goods at the Casino. Yesterday morning it was discovered that the theater had been broken into and eleven guns were missing. Other valuable articles were in the building, but they were not touched by the thieves. The police department is investigating the case, but as yet no clew to the identity of the thieves has been discovered.
