BUCKROE CLOSES ON TUESDAY NIGHT

Tournament in Afternoon Will be Followed by Grand Ball at Night.

GALLANT KNIGHTS WILL RIDE

Commonwealth's Attorney Lewis Will Make Coronation Address and Mr. Harry R. Houston Will Deliver the Charge to the Knights—Those Who Will Ride.

Everything is in readiness for the fifth annual tournament at Buckroe Beach Tuesday afternoon.

Mayor Thornton F. Jones, manager of the tournament, and Manager Charles W. Rex yesterday made the final arrangements and it is expected that an immense crowd will go to the beach to witness the tilting and attend the coronation ball.

Up to the present time twenty-five gallant knights have entered the contest for the several prizes and the right to crown the queen of love and beauty at the elaborate ball, which will take place in the pavilion at night.

High Jumping Race.

Following the tilting will occur a high jumping race, in which all the knights will be allowed to enter their steeds. The prize for this feature is \$5. This should prove an attractive feature to the lovers of horses.

The coronation and ball, which will take place in the pavilion at 8:30 o'clock, will be followed by a banquet in the Buckroe hotel dining room, in which the knights and their ladies will participate. Commonwealth's Attorney Burdette A. Lewis will deliver the coronation address, and Capt. George William Hope will be floor manager at the ball. The pavilion will be given up entirely for the evening to the participants in the tournament and ball.

A Word on Its Travels.

It seems a curious coincidence that the little skiff which skims the waters of the Bosphorus is called a kayak, or, in the French spelling, a caïque, a word apparently identical with the Eskimo kayak. This kayak is a genuine Turkish word, which must have been the property of the undivided Turkish race in their primitive seat in the neighborhood of Lake Baikal prior to the great separation which took the Soljaks westward to the Bosphorus and the Yakuts northward down the Lena to the shores of the Arctic ocean. We find the word among the Turkish tribes of the khanates—kayak, for instance, meaning a ship in the Tshagatal of Khliva—and the Yakuts also took it with them in their northward migration, kayak meaning a keel boat in Yakut.

The probability seems to be that the kayak, denoting etymologically a canoe of "birch bark," originated on the shores of Lake Baikal and that the Eskimos at the mouth of the Lena borrowed the invention and its name from the Yakuts and took it with them in their migrations across Bering strait to the shores of Greenland.

The Laundryman.
