NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—A longshoreman, John Holigan, was so badly injured when through a misunderstanding of signals, the Trinidad Steamship Company's steamer Granada crashed into her pier while trying to make dock early today, that he died in a hospital tonight. Four other men were hurt.

SMITH WOMAN'S CHARACTER SHOWN.

whereas Mrs. Smith was only given five years, had these facts been known before the conclusion of the case her life might have been in imminent peril.

There are other things that have been unearthed since the conclusion of the case. The testimony of Shepherd Knapp Smith gave the birth of the child Ralph as October 15. The little one was, therefore only eight or ten days old when it was turned over to Mrs. Vernon.

From the department of health of Brooklyn a record of the marriage of the Smiths has been secured. The only record that the department sent was one showing that the ceremony was performed in the Church of the Messiah, by Rev. St. Clair Hester on September 14, 1899, a month before the birth of the child.

Good Testimony Missed. The whereabouts of Mrs. Vernon must have been known to the Smiths, but she was hidden in the great city as far as the commonwealth's attorney was concerned.

Had she been found and brought to Richmond, the color of the case, ugly as it was, would have been far uglier; for the little boy, Mrs. Vernon would have testified, was of fine physique, morally clean and one of such gentle disposition that it was the envy of her neighbors.

The evidence cannot be introduced in any way unless the Supreme Court should order a new trial, and then the law would prevent the passing of a heavier sentence on the woman.

Shepherd K. Smith, the husband of Estelle Smith, was today acquitted of the charge of embezzling \$75 from N. J. Crull, a Richmond liveryman, Mr. Crull stating in court that he did not think Smith intended to rob him and that a settlement had been made.

Franco-German Accord Signed. (By Associated Press.) PARIS, Sept. 28.—Premier Rouvier and Prince von Dadohin, the German ambassador, at noon today signed the Franco-German accord concerning the Moroccan conference, thus definitely terminating the difficult negotiations.
