

NAVAL MEN INJURED

Water Tender and Fireman on the Stockton Scalded.

VESSEL IS NOT BADLY HURT

Battleship Squadron Consisting of Eight Splendid Modern Fighting Machines is Headed for Hampton Roads—Cruiser Fleet to Come South

(By Associated Press.) NORFOLK, VA., Oct. 12.—Michael Mara, chief water tender, and Patrick Saulsberry, second-class fireman on the United States torpedo boat Stockton, are at the Norfolk naval hospital seriously scalded as the result of an accident on the Stockton while that vessel was on a five days cruise.

The two men were in the fire room when a tube blew out below. The Stockton was not badly injured.

Battleships Coming. NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—The United States battleships Maine, Missouri, Kentucky, Kearsarge, Alabama, Illinois, Iowa and Massachusetts, of the North Atlantic fleet sailed from New York today for Hampton Roads.

Cruiser Squadron to Come South. NEWPORT, R. I., Oct. 12.—The armored cruiser squadron, consisting of the West Virginia, flagship; Pennsyl-

vania and Colorado; went out to the coaling station at Bradford today. It is expected that the vessels will sail southward after coaling.

NORFOLK ADDS TO ITS GREAT GROWTH

Two Big Plants Are to Be Erected in the City Across the Roads.

NORFOLK, VA., Oct. 12.—M. J. Drummond & Company, manufacturers of iron pipes and similar products have closed a deal securing thirty acres of property, facing 400 feet on the southern branch of the Elizabeth river for the erection of a plant thereon.

It will be conducted in connection with five similar plants owned by the concern in other parts of the country.

It adjoins the tract just secured by the American Cement Company, which will begin at once the erection of a million dollar plant that will employ 1,000 men, and a deal is now on foot for the erection of an iron and steel manufactory on another adjoining tract.


