Chicago Doctor has **DIGGS** lysis White Operating Upon a Patient.

(By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, Oct. 31.—While he performing a serious operation yesterday in the Michael Reese hospital Dr. J. W. Oswald, one of the leading surgeons on the northside, was stricken with paralysis. The operating knife dropped suddenly from his hand. It was picked up by an interne at given back to him, but it dropped again from the doctor's nerveless fingers and then the attendants understood.

They carried him from the room and another surgeon completed the operation. It is not expected that Dr. Oswald will recover. He is 42 years of age.

Soldiers Fire on the Populace. PABIAICE, RUSSIAN POLAND, Oct. 31.—Infantry fired on a procession of workmen here this afternoon, killing eight and wounding twenty-four.

Disorders Put Down With Lead. LODZ, RUSSIAN POLAND, Oct. 31.—The situation here tonight is extremely serious. The general strike is still in progress.

The infantry fired on the mobs, killing two persons and wounding three. An hour later on Konstantin street two persons were killed and eight wounded. At the same hour a collision took place in the suburb of Batuy, where three persons were killed and eight wounded.

The military governor has ordered the troops to mercilessly quell all disorder.

Admiral Evans Stats for North to Meet the Prince of Battenberg.

ENGLISH SQUADRON UNDER WAY

Americans Intended to Join the Visiting Fleet at the Capes, but as it Only Left St. John's Yesterday the Reception Will Be Held Off Historic Maryland Town.

After being in Hampton Roads for more than two weeks, the North Atlantic squadron sailed early yesterday morning for Annapolis, where the squadron will meet the English Flying Squadron under Prince Louis of Battenberg.

It was thought that the two squadrons would meet at Cape Henry, but as Prince Henry did not leave St. John's until yesterday morning Admiral Evans has taken his ships into Annapolis to await the arrival of the Englishman.

President Does Not Mind Storm. CRUISER WEST VIRGINIA OFF CURRITUCK POINT VIA PORTSMOUTH, VA., Oct. 30.—From midnight till noon today the armored cruiser West Virginia, carrying President Roosevelt faced a heavy gale from the northward and eastward with a heavy head sea, making it advisable to slow down from 20 to 18 knots in the afternoon the West Virginia resumed the speed of 20 knots and against a stiff breeze from the northward and eastward proceeded with a moderate sea on our beam.

At 4:30 this afternoon the U. S. S. Maryland, a sister ship of the West Virginia, and the Pennsylvania and Colorado, came up, and after rendering the customary salute and honors to the President's flag, took their position in squadron.

THE STEAM RADIATOR.

If It Doesn't Give Enough Heat Turn the Fan on It.

There are a good many rooms where the radiator is either too small or the steam pressure is too low to maintain a comfortable temperature in severe weather. If the tenant is enjoying the station electric lighting service the matter can easily be remedied. Take an electric fan and set it where it will blow against a large part of the radiator's surface. Turn it on at a low speed or at high if necessary, and your cold room will soon be thoroughly warmed. The philosophy of the thing is that steam at a low pressure carries much less latent heat than steam at a high pressure and therefore warms the radiator so poorly that only a slight draft of air rises around the pipes, and condensation is slow. With the fan in operation there is a forced draft against the radiator that conducts a great deal more heat away from the iron, cooling it so that much condensation of steam occurs inside it. The heat thus snatched from the reluctant radiator is held in the circulating atmosphere of the room, which is soon changed from cold to warm at a trifling cost for electric energy.—Pittsburg Press.
