CIRCUIT COURT ADJOURNS.

After indicting judges of Election in Bloodfield.

The Circuit Court of Warwick county adjourned yesterday morning for the present term. The work of the grand jury was finished Friday afternoon, when indictments were brought in against Shep Curtis, W. C. Mahone and Backus Jones, election officials for the Bloodfield precinct in the recent election.

The indictments were returned on account of the alleged deprivation of voting of Dr. Skelton, of Bloodfield. Although entitled under the Constitution to the privilege of voting, it is claimed that he was denied it. Dr. Skelton is a Confederate veteran and as such is entitled to vote without paying his pole taxes, but he was, it is claimed, denied the right to vote because he had not paid them.

VETOES SAFETY BILL.

Mayor Buxton Does Not Approve of Sections of Ordinance.

Mayor Samuel R. Buxton yesterday vetoed the "public safety" ordinance which has occupied the attention of the city council and the public for the past eighteen months. Revised and amended the ordinance passed both branches of the council but now has met with the disapproval of the mayor.

The mayor's objection to the ordinance is in section V, which requires the city electrician to inspect all electric apparatus, etc., carried by theatrical companies appearing in the local play house prior to each performance, the electrician to be paid not more than \$2 or less than \$1 for his trouble. The mayor offers a substitute for section V of the ordinance.

Mayor Buxton yesterday signed the ordinance authorizing the Newport News Light and Water Company to extend its mains up Washington avenue so as to furnish fire hydrants to the shipyard.

HORSE THEFT CHARGED.

Former Newport News Man Arrested in Reading, Pa.

It was learned here yesterday that Watson Loomis, a former resident of this city, has been arrested in Reading, Pa., on the charge of horse stealing and will be tried about Dec. 1.

Justice J. D. G. Brown received a letter from Charles M. Blanks, an attorney of Reading, asking about Loomis' record here. The attorney says that the case in Reading looks bad for the man, who lived in this city several years and has frequently been in police court here, although the evidence is said to be entirely circumstantial.
