

# HAMPTON, PHOEBUS AND OLD POINT.

## TEN CENT FARE TO OLD POINT

Announcement of the Increase of Five Cents Made by Both Railway Companies Yesterday.

WILL BE IN EFFECT DECEMBER 2

Wisacres Who Have Been Declaring That the Fare Would be Placed Back to Fifteen Cents for Trip Given a Pleasant Shock by Official Announcement From Companies.

Announcement was made yesterday by the Newport News and Old Point Railway and Electric Company and the Hampton Roads Traction Company that beginning with Saturday, December 2, the fare between Newport News and Old Point on either line will be increased to 10 cents. This means that a person in Newport News can ride to Hampton for five cents or he can continue his visit to Old Point for an additional five cents.

For several days rumors to the effect that the railway companies intended to place the fare up to fifteen cents have been in circulation, but the official announcement thoroughly dissipates that idea and the increase of five cents only for the twelve mile ride will come in the nature of a surprise to those wisacres who have predicted a much larger increase in fare.

So far as the folks in Hampton are concerned the increase will not be felt. It has always cost a Hampton man five cents to ride to Old Point and five cents to go to Newport News.

The general public has for some time realized that the railway company in transporting its passenger from Old Point to Newport News a five cents was giving more than "only" reasonably be expected and the increase will certainly not cause any unfavorable comment. In fact it will be accepted as a rather generous treatment from the railway companies to keep the fare down to 10 cents over the line between Old Point and Newport News.

Considering that Old Point and Newport News are twelve miles apart the fare now announced is no greater than is paid in the larger cities, where the travel is much larger than in this section.

## OLD POINT COLLEGE DEFEAT N. N. H. S.

## MR. J. W. ROWE IS PRESIDENT

Elizabeth County Merchants' Association Formed Last With Large Membership.

## MR. VON SCHILLING SECRETARY

Hunter R. Booker, A. M. Hanger and R. B. Diggs Elected Vice-Presidents. Movement Started to Have the Legislature Repeal the Act Imposing Tax on Stocks of Goods.

The merchants of Hampton, Phoebus and Elizabeth City county met in armory hall last night and organized the Merchants' Association of Elizabeth City county. There was a large attendance of the men engaged in the mercantile business and the new organization starts out with much enthusiasm among the members.

Mr. John W. Rowe called the meeting to order and Mr. Marshall von Schilling was asked to preside as secretary.

Letter From Judge Dudley.

Judge Sidney J. Dudley, the counsel for the merchants in the fight against the taxing of capital used in their stocks, sent a letter to the association in which he gave a full synopsis of the opinion handed down by Judge Blackstone. Judge Dudley made several recommendations and the association unanimously determined to adopt the letter and its suggestions.

One of the features of the suggestions given by Judge Dudley was that the best way to get rid of the burdensome tax is by legislative action and he suggested further that this association enlist the assistance of the merchants in every county throughout the State in having the legislature repeal the tax law relative to the capital used in the stocks of goods of merchants. This suggestion was heartily approved by the association.

The association also unanimously voted to support the movement started by Judge P. S. Groscup relative to congressional legislation on the tariff rates of railways.

This matter will come up at the next session of congress and the secretary was directed to forward the endorsement of this association to the movement to the proper authorities. It has already been endorsed in every city and town of any size.
