**THE DAY WE CELEBRATE.**

In Virginia January 19th, by an act of the General Assembly, is set aside as a legal holiday, because it is the anniversary of the birth of one of the purest and best men that ever stood out as a representative of Southern honor and chivalry. History gives us the measure of Lee's incomparable military genius. In the roster of the world's greatest warriors he stands beside such men as Napoleon, Von Moltke and Charlemagne, but it is not merely as a soldier that the people of Virginia love to think of the matchless blarney of a proud and honorable name. Not alone in the camp and on the battlefield did this son of the Old Dominion show himself to be worthy of honor and love. In fact, the sterling qualities of his character did not show out in all their simple majesty until the fires of temptation tempered and purified and placed him upon a pedestal from which no man of modern times may hope to replace him.

His refusal to permit his name to be connected with the questionable Louisiana Lottery scheme as well as his refusal to accept a salary with a life insurance company greater than he could hope to honestly earn stamped him as nature's greatest handiwork -- "an honest man."

In all the walks of life, he seemed to strive to carry out the high maxim he is once said to have formulated: "Duty is the greatest word in the language."

A Carnegie may strew his free libraries from one end of the land to the other and a Rockefeller may endow colleges and educational institutions, but coming generations of Virginians will stop to ask, "Who was Carnegie? Who was Rockefeller?" when the inspiration of Lee's example and the inspiring story of his noble life will remain among the living realities of the time.

Young man, would you live nobly and for the advancement of humanity? Then study the life of Robert E. Lee and follow his example.

**KENTUCKY AND THE EXPOSITION.**

A bill has been introduced in the Kentucky legislature to appropriate \$25,000 for the purpose of having the Blue Grass State properly represented at the Jamestown Exposition in 1907. Commenting upon the plan outlined for that representation the esteemed Louisville Courier-Journal has this to say:

"If this idea is carried out there may be required a larger appropriation than that named, and the legislature should recognize the fact. Kentucky, of all other States, cannot afford to take half-way action in the matter. More than half the States have responded to the invitation with evidence of liberal and hearty co-operation, and if Kentucky is to have a place at the board it must be a representation worthy of her relations to the mother State, and of her good name as a prosperous and generous Commonwealth. Fortunately the representation suggested as illustrating her history, progress and material welfare, growth, enterprise and development, will not only attest her filial devotion and desire to commemorate so great an event in history, but it will be a tenfold in the opportunity presented for making known her material resources and securing thereby an influx of capital and population for their development."

If this generous sentiment is representative of the attitude of the other daughters of the Old Dominion there can be little doubt that the celebration of the 200th anniversary of the landing at Jamestown will be one of the most successful and most inspiring of the great exhibitions thus far held.

**THE PATTISON BILL.**

The bill introduced in the General Assembly by Hon. Camm Pattison, to so amend the school law as to divide the school money that the negro educational institutions will only receive that proportion of the available funds as is paid in by the colored taxpayers themselves, will cause no alarm. The proposition has been fought out to a finish on numerous occasions and we do not believe the sentiment in Virginia is favorable to reactionary measures along that line. A recrudescence of the agitation at this time, however, is unfortunate, inasmuch as many who bear no love for the South will seize upon it as another opportunity to defame the Southern people for alleged injustice to the colored people of this section.

The people of Virginia are not without hope of materially benefiting the negro by educating him to a proper extent. That their efforts have been unqualifiedly successful is not claimed even by the friends of the colored race, but there is ground for encouragement and there is yet no inclination to give up the experiment.

Much money has been wasted on unworthy negroes but the same might be said of many whites. That an educated man, white or black, is a more dangerous criminal than an uneducated one, is true under some conditions, but the rule also holds good when applied to the value of the average citizen who keeps out of the clutches of the police.

It is safe to predict that the Pattison bill will not pass.

The Gordonsville Gazette is "unqualifiedly in favor of the nomination of a Southern man for the Presidency the next time. If Eastern and Western Democrats will not support our nominee we will have the satisfaction of knowing it and at the same time maintaining self-respect." It is to be hoped that this sentiment will continue to grow and that it will result in a declaration of independence on the part of Southern Democrats at the next national convention.

In its little hour with the President the Senate will undoubtedly save its Bacon.
