RAPID GROWTH OF MEN'S BIBLE CLASS
Organization Now Numbers 268 Members and Many Conversions Have Followed.

NO DENOMINATIONAL LINES THERE
George A. Schmelz Formed the Class and His Endeavors Have Been Crowned With Success—Sermon Subjects at the Various Churches in Hampton Today.

Probably no religious organization in Hampton has enjoyed a greater growth in a short length of time than the Men's Bible class of the West End Memorial Baptist church. The class was organized by Mr. George A. Schmelz and has grown from a gathering of about 20 to 268 members. Each Sunday morning at 10 o'clock the members assemble in the church and spend an hour discussing the Bible together, without regard to denominational preference. Since the class was formed many men have professed religion and joined churches. Mr. Schmelz spends much of his time in the week looking after the members and asking other men to become members. There are many social features in

connection with the organization and the class has accomplished good work in the charitable lines.
