BURTON MUST GO TO PRISON.

Supreme Court Affirms Judgment of Conviction of Senator.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 21.—The appeal of Senator Joseph Ralph Burton, of Kansas, was today decided by the Supreme Court of the United States against Burton.

Burton is under sentence by the Circuit Court for the Eastern District of Missouri to serve six months in the county jail and pay \$2,000 fine on one count, and serve six months and pay \$500 fine on a second count of an indictment charging that he acted as counsel for the Rialto Grain and Securities Companies in a fraud order proceeding before the postoffice department.

Novice of a Jockey Drives the Game Little Horse Under the Wire a Winner of a Purse Worth \$20,000—Dandelion Comes in Second.

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 21.—Coming through a flying field with a splendid burst of speed, Toakalin, owned by J. W. Fuller, and ridden by Bedell, almost a novice, in the saddle, won the Brooklyn handicap at Gravesend today.

LONG LIFE FOR EARTH. Professor Believes Planet Will Be Habitable a Hundred Million Years.

CHICAGO, May 21.—That the earth will be habitable for a hundred million years to come is the belief of Dr. Thomas C. Chamberlin, head of the department of geology in the University of Chicago.

Professor Chamberlin declared that climatic phenomena and temperature conditions of the last hundred million years warranted him in offering the foregoing optimistic prophecy.

"The human race really has just come into possession of the earth. The fact that the rocks and the animals have had their eras of prosperity is the basis for my belief that we shall have millions of years to work out our ideals of intellectuality."
