ROOSEVELT TO VISIT THE NORMAL SCHOOL

President White in This Vicinity Will Stop Off on the Peninsula for Short Time.

MEETING NOT FOR THE PUBLIC

Memorial Day to Be Observed at the Soldiers' Home—Congressman Landis Will Deliver the Oration—Public Buildings to Be Closed, as on Sundays.

National Memorial or Decoration Day, will be observed on the lower end of the Peninsula today. In Hampton the banks will be closed all day and the postoffice will observe Sunday hours. In Phoebus the postoffice will close, observing Sunday hours. At Old Point it will be a day of little work among the soldiers in the Fort Monroe garrison, following the custom only that work which is absolutely necessary will be done. On the lately reservation and there, the post office will observe Sunday hours.

Perhaps the most interesting exhibition of the day in this section will be in the old cemetery at the National Soldiers' Home, when the various posts of the Grand Army of the Republic will hold memorial exercises. Congressman Charles B. Landis of Indiana, will be the speaker of the occasion. An interesting program will be rendered. Following the exercises in the old cemetery, the veterans will place flowers on the graves of their dead comrades.

There will be an entire suspension of business around the big institution during the day. It is hoped that President Roosevelt, who is to speak at the Hampton Normal School this afternoon, will visit the Soldiers' Home during the afternoon, but the President has not yet signified his intention of so doing.

The members of the Phoebus Fire Department, carrying out one of the pretty customs of the organization will decorate the graves of their dead members in Oakland and St. John's cemeteries this morning.

During the time the presidential party is at the Normal School the grounds of that institution will be closed to the general public. It is expected that the President will make a short address to the pupils of the school.

A number of Hampton folk will go to Port mouth this morning to hear President Roosevelt speak. The President is to address the Army and Navy Union here.

The Peninsula Guards, Captain Thornton F. Jones, will go to Port mouth this morning to participate in the Memorial Day exercises. Captain Jones expects to carry a large company. Arrangements for the trip were made at the drill of the company last evening.
