

LOST FUNNEL AND MAST

Steamer Georgetown Arrives in Badly Crippled Condition.

WEATHERED HOWLING NOR'WESTER

Great Waves Washed Over Vessel and Smokestack Was Broken Off Two Feet Below the Deck—Goes to Shipyard.

Shipping men and others along the waterfront were yesterday morning treated to one of the most novel sights ever seen at this port—that of a ship slowly steaming into port without a sign of a smokestack and with the smoke from her funnels apparently issuing from a hole cut in her decks.

The Georgetown left Boston for Newport News in ballast last Thursday night and at midnight Saturday night, when 20 miles southwest of Winterquarter light, she was struck by a howling nor'wester accompanied by heavy seas.

The steamer finally rode through the storm and after a temporary smokestack had been made of short boards, she proceeded to this port. The Georgetown probably will go to the shipyard to have a new funnel and mizzen-mast put on and repairs made to her decks before she loads a cargo of coal here for the return trip to Boston.

DOLPHINS AS FOOD. Breton Fishers Feast Off of Them With Relish.

A curious new fishery and a still more novel source of food supply has just been submitted to the Breton folk, sorely tried by the failure of the sardines.

The Prince de la Tour d'Auvergne, after taking part in the St. Malo regatta, went to the St. Cast in an automobile boat to visit the Comte de Carnegre-Treccion.

The motor boat set up a great commotion among the blowing dolphins with which the bay swarms, and a regular battue was organized, with the result that sixty-nine of the great creatures were captured—it is believed the entire shoal.

Some of them were eight feet long and weighed 300 pounds. They were distributed among the people, who ate the flesh readily, pronouncing it like "wild boar." Dolphins have ruined the Breton coast fishery this year. The prince took a cast of the biggest as a model for submarine construction.—London Globe.

Judge Barham Calls Docket and Disposes of Business.

GRAND JURY SITS TOMORROW

Case of Claude A. Goodman Among the Numerous Matters to Be Investigated—Mr. Robinson Says a Busy Month is Ahead.

The Corporation Court convened yesterday morning for the October term. Judge Barham called his docket and disposed of various minor matters.

KILLED OR DROWNED BY FALL FROM SCAFFOLDING

Misstep Cost S. P. Lovitt, a Ship Carpenter, His Life—Leaves Young Wife.

Making a misstep and losing his balance while at work on scaffolding on the north side of the oil steamer S. W. Porter, at the shipyard yesterday morning, S. P. Lovitt, a ship carpenter, fell thirty feet to the water and was killed or drowned. The body of the unfortunate man did not rise to the surface again and grappling hooks had to be used to recover it.

Lovitt had been employed at the yard for nine years. Last January he was married to a Miss Bray, of Gloucester county, who survives him. The body will be taken to Gloucester for interment.
