

WILL NOT COMPLAIN TO FEDERAL COMMISSION

Believed That Such Action Would Not Stop Discrimination Against City.

SECRETARY FARRAR RESIGNS

Exploitation Commission Declines to Accept Resignation and He Agrees to Continue to Serve for Present—Report of Money Collected and Expended—Advertising Plans.

Although it was generally expected that the Exploitation Commission would last night take up the matter of sending a delegation to Washington to appear before the national commission of the Jamestown exposition relative to the discrimination against Newport News in the advertising matter of the Jamestown Exposition Company, the matter was not brought before the commission, and, although the idea of sending such a delegation to Washington originated with a member of the commission, a majority of the commissioners apparently have no intention of taking any action along this line.

In the opinion of many members of the commission such a course would do this city more harm than good. The commissioners who proposed the movement seemed satisfied from the start that the national commission could not prevent the exposition company from advertising Norfolk and the only advantage this city could derive from the appeal to the national commission would be the notoriety thereby gained for the city. Whether such notoriety is desired is a question, but evidently a majority of the members of the Commission are opposed to that kind of advertising.

The commission met in the parlors of the Pocomantas Hotel with Chairman Aho Horwitz in the chair and the following members present: Mayor Samuel R. Buxton, R. M. Little, W. S. Upshur, T. L. Farrar, C. C. Hundley and Alex Meyers.

Secretary T. L. Farrar tendered his resignation to the Commission, but it was not accepted and at the request of those present, Mr. Farrar consented to serve as secretary of the commission until a successor can be selected.

The secretary made a detailed report of what had been done by the commission up to this time. This report showed that about \$200 had been expended for a double page advertisement in the "Jamestown Edition of the Rydale Hand Book," 100,000 thousand copies of which are being distributed through out the South and West, and that about \$330 had been expended on 200,000 envelopes bearing the device adopted by the commission. These envelopes will be ready for distribution in a few days.

Cuts Ordered.

The commission has also ordered four cuts of scenes in and about the city, which will be used in advertisements to appear in the May issue of magazines, of which copies will be issued about the time the Jamestown exposition opens. One of these cuts represents Uncle Sam stepping from the exposition to Newport News, another is made from a photograph of the waterfront, showing the shipyard, the Chesapeake & Ohio piers and the other piers on the waterfront. Another shows a beautiful woman holding a map of Tidewater Virginia, showing the location of the exposition, Newport News, Hampton, Phoebus and Old Point Comfort. The fourth cut shows a bugler standing on the deck of a United States battleship sounding the "mess" call.

Mr. J. A. Willett, treasurer of the commission, was unable to attend the meeting on account of illness, and no report of the treasurer was received. It is estimated, however, that the commission has approximately \$2,000 in hand with about \$1,300 yet to be collected. Those who have promised subscriptions to the exploitation fund should send the amount of their subscriptions to Treasurer Willett or Secretary T. L. Farrar.

In lieu of issuing a booklet containing a general guide to this city and section with a list of the hotels and boarding houses, the commission decided to have 50,000 or more folders printed. Each commissioner was directed to prepare reading matter to be printed on these folders and to present same to the commission at the meeting to be held within the next ten days. It is proposed to distribute these folders among the business men of the city and have them sent one in every letter mailed out of the city.

ESTIMATE ON REPAIRING TRANSPORT KILPATRICK

Three Vards Sent Copies of Specifications—Similar Work on Meade and Sumner.

Estimates on repairing and overhauling the United States army transport Kilpatrick which is due to arrive at this port from Havana, Cuba, next Saturday, will be opened in the offices of the quartermaster's depot in the Silsby building at 12 o'clock noon, February 7.

Specifications for all necessary repairs to the ship have just been issued by the quartermaster's depot, and copies of same have been forwarded to the Newport News Shipbuilding & Dry Dock Company, the Maryland Steel Company, Sparrow's Point, Md., and the Norfolk navy yard.

Extensive repair work will have to be done on the Kilpatrick and in addition to that she will be given a thorough overhauling, and supplied with a large amount of new and extra equipment. The engines and boilers will be overhauled and repaired where necessary, the electric lighting plant, refrigerating plant, pumping plant and piping system will be overhauled and new equipment furnished for the steward's department.

Similar repairs are to be made to the transports Meade and Ingalls, now anchored in the harbor here. Specifications covering the repairs to these vessels are now being prepared and bids will be asked in the near future.

ANOTHER CHILD LABOR LAW IN THE SENATE

Senator Simmons of North Carolina Has a Measure Which Doesn't Infringe on State Rights.

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 25.—Senator Simmons today introduced a child labor bill which is designed to make it unlawful for an interstate carrier to transport from one State of production into another State products of a mine or factory in which children are employed or permitted to work in violation of the child labor laws of the State in which the factory or mine is located.

This bill differs from the Beveridge bill in that it does not undertake to make a child labor law, but recognizes the child labor laws of the several States and seeks to make them effective. It is based upon the idea that nearly all the States have child labor laws and that they are largely ineffective and will remain so as long as they can only be enforced by local prosecution for their violation.

This Mr. Simmons thinks, will make the State laws effective by making it practically impossible for a factory or mine to violate those laws and obtain the benefits of interstate transportation.

BILL PASSED BY SENATE

Exposition Company Practically Sure of Getting Loan.

MEASURE GOES TO HOUSE NOW

Officials Expect Little Opposition and Think the Million Dollars Will be Available in the Very Near Future.

An "urgent deficiency" bill authorizing a loan of \$1,000,000 by the Federal government to the Jamestown Exposition was passed in the Senate yesterday.

The exposition company officials believe that this bill will pass the House with little opposition and expect the million dollars to be available in the near future. The precedent of lending money to expositions has been set and, as there can be no complaint upon the security offered by the Jamestown Company, no good reason can be advanced for opposing the loan. It is proposed to repay the government with the first gate receipts.

ATTACKS ARMY OFFICERS.

Col. Gaines Accuses Them of Acting Like Aristocrats Toward Privates.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Jan. 25.—Aristocracy in the American army was bitterly attacked in a speech before a large gathering of churchmen this evening by Col. Noel Gaines, late of the United States army and the Kentucky militia. He fiercely assailed the arguments of advocates of the army canteen. Col. Gaines is himself a member of a distinguished Southern family, and is a relative of Congressman John Wesley Gaines. Col. Gaines declared that the desertions from the army were due principally to the "apishness" of many officers in their dealings with the privates. Officers, he said, have charged these desertions to the absence of the army canteen.

"I declare it is due to the wide gulf between the officers and men, the lack of fellowship and sympathy between the two, and the high-mindedness of the officers, which in some cases can scarcely be distinguished from the attitude of Russian aristocracy toward the peasantry."

Objection of officers to the anti-canteen law he ascribed the fact that in disregard of the Federal regulations, officers' clubs are still selling liquor and the officers fear an application of the State laws to these organizations.
