

LIGHTS WIRELESS ELECTRIC LAMPS

R. B. Garland, of Ansonia, Conn.,
Makes Experiment Along Line
of New Telegraphy

POWER PENETRATES THRO' DOORS

Test Made in House With Several
Persons Present—Incandescent
Globe is Used and There Seems to
Have Been a Most Interesting Elec-
trical Experiment Made.

ANSONIA, Conn., Feb. 11.—That the principles of wireless telegraphy may be applied in transmitting through the air as a medium, electricity sufficient to light an electric lamp or series of lamps has been practically demonstrated by R. B. Garland, of No. 22 Mott street, this city, former superintendent of the fire alarm system. He has been employing his period of recuperation from an accident which happened to him several weeks ago to carry out experiments along this line.

Mr. Garland's recent demonstration of the importance of the discovery of wireless telegraphy is a result of recent experiments along this line carried on by some eminent French electricians. Although his apparatus was somewhat crude, which affected his results, his experiment, he believes, proved beyond reasonable doubt that he could produce electrical waves of a high voltage and transmit power through the air without any direct communication.

Dry Cells Were Used.

In this experiment ten dry cells were used, although a storage battery could be employed. Fifty feet from these cells, in his house, an induction coil was placed and connected with an ordinary incandescent lamp. One side of the secondary or high tension winding of this coil was grounded with gas pipe, while a condenser was bridged across the two pole pieces of the primary circuit. The other side of the secondary circuit was used as aerial conductor.

At this distance Mr. Garland found that the ten cells would produce on the primary winding of the induction

coil a voltage of about fifteen, which varied only slightly as the distance between the cells and the induction coil was decreased. The lamp employed was an ordinary incandescent street lamp of 25 candle power. One conductor of this lamp was grounded to a water pipe and a suitable resistance cut in on the other pole leading to the aerial conductor, which consisted simply of the brass pole pieces attached to the lamp.

To further test the practicability of this experiment Mr. Garland closed the adjoining rooms thus closing the battery, to see if the interposition of the wooden doors would affect the electric waves. This, however, showed no appreciable effect on the intensity of the light.

Believing the condenser was not strong enough, Mr. Garland had three persons join hands, and one of them took hold of the aerial conductor, one of the brass pieces of the lamp. When the switch was again turned on he found that it produced a perceptible increase in the intensity of the light.

HE WILL PLAY WITH THE FORKS OF LIGHTNING

Edison on His Sixtieth Birthday
Says He Will Experiment Only
For Personal Amusement.

NEWARK, N. J., Feb. 11.—Thomas Alva Edison, the inventor says when a man gets to be sixty it is time to knock off work, and play awhile. Mr. Edison is sixty years old today, and his playtime begins. "For forty-five years I have been making experiments with electricity," said Mr. Edison last night, "but all the past years I have been turning these experiments to commercial value so fast that I have not had a chance to play with electricity for the fun of the thing, just to see how much I can find about it. But from tomorrow on I am going to give up the commercial end of it and work in my laboratory purely as a scientist. That will be a pleasure I have long promised myself."

One Hour in Jail and Fined \$250.

LYNCHBURG, VA., Feb. 11.—L. W. Morgan, charged with attempting to kill E. W. Morgan, Nov. 29, was given one hour in jail and fined \$250.

The two men were not on good terms, and E. W. Morgan, at the time of the quarrel, struck L. W. Morgan on Mall street. The latter fired five times at his adversary, wounding him in four places.

HAYTI AND ITS DEBT

Believed That There Will be no
Trouble With Germany.

BANKERS REFUSED SETTLEMENT

In Truly South American Republic
Manner, Hayti Pays a Debt By
Fining and Imprisoning People
Who Want Their Money.

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 11.—Believing in the justice of its position the Haytian government does not expect any serious difficulty with Germany growing out of certain transactions with Remann & Company bankers of Port Au Prince, and a syndicate of Haytians, Germans and others, who received considerable sums from Hayti in cash and bonds, on account of various public improvements.

Mr. Leger, Haytian minister to the United States, has been kept fully informed as to the facts in the case which is an old one and which twice has been before the Haytian courts. Hayti in both instances being sustained in her contentions. The trouble arises out of the allegations on the part of Hayti that the syndicate and the House of Hermann & Company received sums in excess of those to which they were entitled, on account of an alleged conspiracy which, it is stated by Minister Leger, involves a former minister of finance.

After the case was tried in the Haytian courts, the Hermann's were ordered to refund a part of the moneys received by them as well as to pay \$5,000,000 damages and a fine of \$800, but it is stated by the Haytian government in a spirit of conciliation remit a large portion of both the damages and the fine.

The amount which the court ordered the banking house to pay back was \$135,000 in cash, but the Haytian government expressed its willingness to take one third of it in cash and the rest in certain government bonds which had been turned over in payment for the work. This offer the Hermann's refused and made a counter proposition, which has been declined. Hermann & Company then laid the matter before the German minister and the whole subject is being thrashed out by the two governments.

ELECT BRIGADIER SATURDAY.

The Fight is an Open One—Those
Who are to Make Choice.

RICHMOND, VA., Feb. 11.—The staff officers of the three regiments of Infantry will assemble here Saturday at four o'clock to elect a brigadier general.

One of the best known officers in the State said today that the contest was open to all the people in or out of the service is eligible to the position. It has been the custom to promote the officer longest in the service and in that case Colonel C. C. Vaughan, of the Seventy-first Regiment would win the honor.

The officers who are to participate in the election are as follows: Seventieth Regiment—Colonel William J. Perry, of Staunton; Lieutenant-Colonel Robert E. Craighill of Lynchburg; Major C. Gray Bossieux, of Richmond; Major Stanley W. Martin, of Danville and Major J. King, of Alexandria.

Seventy-first Regiment—Colonel C. C. Vaughan, Jr., of Franklin; Lieutenant Colonel T. J. Nottingham of Norfolk; Major E. W. Owen, of Portsmouth; Major B. W. Salomnsky, of Norfolk, and Major E. E. Goodwin, of Emporia.

Seventy-second Regiment—Colonel R. F. Leedy, of Luray; Lieutenant Colonel S. R. Miller, Major Edwin H. Gibson, of Culpeper Major Asa Leigh R. Moody of Petersburg.

Bank Suffers a \$600 Loss.
