TRADING WAS VERY DULL

Day Devoted Mostly to What Looked Like Testing Operations.

LITTLE STRENGTH EARLY IN DAY

Notwithstanding the Yielding of the Money Market Wall Street Regards the Existing Conditions With Distrust—Harriman a Disturber.

(By Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, April 11.—The stock market was still largely in professional hands today, but operations were conducted in a more aggressive manner and were extended to further hours. Constant shifting of position still indicated a very uncertain frame of mind on the part of the professionals.

Much of the day's session was given up to what looked like testing operations without developing the prevailing tendency of the market. The trading sank into extreme dullness at times until the discouraging influence of these failures and then yielded decidedly. Such strength as the market showed was most in evidence in the early part of the day. Part of this was in response to a rise in London markets as a result of the reduction in the official discount rate of the bank of England from 5 to 4 1/2 per cent.

The previous course of the money market gave ample warning of the action and gave opportunity for discrediting it in the securities market. Notwithstanding this general and continued yielding of money rates all over the world the stock market begins to reflect misgivings over its ability to meet the large waiting demands. These include large volumes of authorized but unissued securities or where the sale of these is impracticable, probable further note issues. Signs of a movement of currency back to the interior which gave warning of the large requirements of the continued activity intrade. Another specific influence in the day's movement was the report from Washington of the decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission to advise proceedings against the Harriman railroad system as a combination in restraint of trade within the meaning of the law.

The closing tone was steady and at some recovery from the lowest. Bonds were dull and irregular. Total sales par value, \$1,480,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call. MANY NOTABLES THERE

Rededication of The Pittsburg Carnegie Institute a Splendid Affair

HIGHEST OF PRAISE FOR DONOR

All of the Speakers and President Roosevelt in a Letter, Speak in Most Complimentary Terms of the Ex-Steel King.

PITTSBURG, PA., April 11.—The formal rededication exercises of the Carnegie Institute of Pittsburg, valued at \$6,000,000, and one of the most beautiful and complete institutions of its kind in the world, were brought to a close today with the announcement of the prize winners in the international art exhibition.

Tonight the foreign and American guests attended a concert given in their honor by the Pittsburg Orchestra directed by Mr. Emil Paur. The concert was the most brilliant in the history of the orchestra. The ceremonies today, while elaborate, were marked with extreme simplicity. Addresses of international importance were delivered by His Excellency, Theodore Von Moeller, Minister of State, Germany; Paul Doumer, ex-speaker of the Chamber of Deputies, Paris; Andrew Carnegie; Baron D'Esternes de Constant member of the senate, Paris, and Doctor John Rhils, principal of Jesus College University of Oxford. Rev. E. S. Roberts, vice chancellor of the University of Cambridge, Eng., delivered the invocation.

A lengthy letter of regret from President Roosevelt was read by the secretary of the institute. In his letter the President praised Mr. Carnegie for the great gift to science and education. During the exercises the President was referred to as the "great peacemaker" and applause greeted every mention of his name. Minister of State Von Moeller paid a glowing tribute to Mr. Carnegie in his address.

The notable feature of the exercises today was the parade of the European and American guests from the Hotel Schenley to the Institute over a square away. The march began about 1:30, the route being along Forbes street to the east entrance of the building. Director A. A. Hamerschlag, of the Carnegie Technical school accompanied by the faculty headed the procession.

Immediately behind came Andrew Carnegie and William N. Frew, president of the institute. Next came the foreign guests followed by Mayor Guthrie, prominent Pittsburghers and the American guests.

The exercises will continue Friday

and Saturday. Those of tomorrow will probably be of the greatest importance as the distinguished foreigners and American guests will discuss international peace. The Carnegie Technical schools will be inspected and the ladies of the party will be entertained at tea in honor of Mrs. Carnegie.

LOCUST STREET WILL HAVE TROLLEY SERVICE

Town Council Granted the Franchise to the Street Railway Company at Last Night's Meeting.

At an adjourned meeting of the Hampton town council last night the ordinance granting the Newport News and Old Point Railway and Electric Company a franchise in Locust street was unanimously adopted.

The company will pay the town \$100 for the right of way, as well as pave its share of the street.

The ordinance allowing the Hampton Roads Traction Company authority to take up its tracks, poles and wires in the town was placed on the table until the May session of the council.

Ordinances covering the awnings, street obstructions and stepping stones along the streets, were referred to the ordinance committee for action between now and the May meeting.

Several unimportant matters were taken up and discussed and the council adjourned.

OFFICERS GAVE BANKS VERY HARD CHASE

He Was in York County and the Officers Nearly Captured Him on Three Occasions.

As predicted in the Daily Press, William Banks, the colored man, under arrest for murdering Jake Smith and Samuel Robinson, valved a preliminary hearing before Mayor Thornton F. Jones yesterday morning. The case was certified to the grand jury. Banks, in a talk with Deputy Sheriff Edwin Curtis, yesterday, said that he gave himself up to the officers because of the manner in which they were pursuing him. He felt confident he would be arrested. In fact, Banks said that several times in York county the officers were close on his heels. He told Mr. Curtis that had he been inclined to do so on three occasions while the sheriff, Deputy Sheriff C. C. Curtis and Officer Thomas Watts were pursuing him in York county Monday afternoon and night, he could have shot and killed Mr. Edwin Curtis.

Banks' confession fully sustains the claims of the county officers that they were aware of his presence in York county and that had he not been driven to it he would probably never have surrendered.

In York county Banks had a hard row to travel. He was refused something to eat by everyone to whom he applied for food and none of the people of that section would shelter him.
