ALONG THE WATERFRONT
Captain Donnelly Promoted to Command of the Mariana.
STEAMER ARRIVED IN PORT SUNDAY
 Chief Engineer of the Vessel is George W. Dunn, a Former Resident of this City. O. D. Linc Princess Anne at Shipyard.
 Captain P. F. Donnelly, formerly first officer of the Furness-Withy Line steamship Mariana, which arrived here Sunday from London, has been promoted to the command of the Mariana and he brought her across the Atlantic on this trip. Captain Donnelly is well known here and the news of his promotion was received with pleasure by his friends.
 Captain R. Parker, who has commanded the Mariana for several years, has been transferred and promoted to the command of the new steamship Rappallo, now at Hamburg. The Rappallo was built at that port, but recently was purchased by Furness-Withy & Company, Ltd., and will ply between England and Australia.
 Another officer on the Mariana who is well known in Newport News is Chief Engineer George H. Dunn. He was the senior engineering officer of the old British steamship Bavarian, which plied here 14 or 15 years ago. He resigned from that ship to accept a position at the shipyard here as supervisor of the construction of engines for merchant ships. He held that position for a number of years, then resigned and returned to his home.
 While working here, Mr. Dunn joined the local lodge of Masons and on

returning to England he transferred his membership to a lodge in that country. A year ago he decided to go back to sea and was appointed chief engineer of the Mariana.

TURRETS FOR DELAWARE.
 Work Has Been Started on Them at Shipyard.
 Work on the turrets for the 29,000 ton battleship Delaware has been started at the shipyard and rapid progress has already been made on the shells of two of the turrets.
 The Delaware will carry five 12 inch gun turrets; three forward and two aft. The extreme forward and extreme aft turrets will be located on the same deck and the remaining two forward and one aft will be located on a deck above. All of them will be on the center line and the ship will have a broadside fire of ten 12 inch rifles.

APRIL TERM OF COURT BEGINS
 Commonwealth's Attorney Berkeley Says Mrs. Baker Will be Tried For Infanticide This Month—Grand Jury Sits Monday.
 Judge Barham, in the Corporation Court yesterday, set April 20, next Monday, as the date for the trial of Harry Witchevah the Indian who is charged with the murder of Dora Hall.
 The case of Dan Waterman, charged with the murder of Theodore Helmer, was set for trial Wednesday, April 22.
 Commonwealth's Attorney Berkeley said yesterday that the case of Mrs. Annie B. Baker, indicted for infanticide, would be tried some time during this term. Mrs. Baker is now in North Carolina, but the authorities know where she can be found and will bring her here unless she appears for trial voluntarily.
 The April term of the Corporation Court began yesterday morning. Judge Barham called his docket and set numerous cases for trial. A grand jury will sit tomorrow.
