## WAS VERY RAGGED GAME

Costly Errors Gave the Contest to Old Point Comfort College.

## HAMPTON HIGH SCHOOL HAD OFF DAY

Absence of Burbanks in the Box Sorely Felt by the Hamptonians. Score Was 7 to 3 in Favor of Collegians—Meet Again Tomorrow.

Ragged playing and costly error in the sixth inning gave the game to Old Point Comfort College and the Hampton High school to the college yesterday afternoon by the score of 7 to 3.

High school entered the contest without its best pitcher, Burbanks, and this seemed to have demoralized the team from the start. McMinamen started in to pitch, but was relieved in the fifth by Brittingham, who was relieved behind the bat by Wilson.

The contest was played on New Park diamond and while Old Point Comfort College put up a snappy game its victory was partly due to an error in the sixth by Diestil, who allowed a hot one to pass through his hand and let three men in. In fact the Hampton nine played a game of half way Chinese ball, costly errors being charged up to Robinson, Diestil, Brittingham and Wilson.

For the college, McCann, Harrison, Klor and Betts were the stars.

The contest was cleanly played and the umpiring of Tony Monroe, of Old Point, was one of the features. There was not a kick on any of Monroe's decisions.

## SUB-STATION POSTOFFICE FOR THE NORMAL SCHOOL

Postmaster Libbey Succeeds in Securing Big Advantages for the Schools in Mail Facilities.

Announcement was made yesterday that the postoffice department in Washington has decided to establish a sub-station at the Hampton Normal and Agricultural Institute, under the Hampton office, on July first.

Postmaster Harry Libbey has been working on the plan to secure a sub-station at the Normal school ever since he entered upon his office and the success of the movement will be gratifying to the school and its friends. Under the new office the Normal school will be permitted to issue money orders, registered letters and all stamps, although all returns will be made to Postmaster Libbey.

It is understood that the department will pay the school postmaster \$100 per year and it is expected that the authorities will appoint the person recommended for the position by the school.
