## ROBERT JONES' JURY IS UNABLE TO AGREE

After Being Out Sometime the Jury Reported Its Inability to Reach Verdict to Court.

### WAS LOCKED UP FOR THE NIGHT

As the Charge is One in Which the Death Penalty Can Be Inflicted the Twelve Men Must Remain Together Until Discharged by Judge Clarence W. Robinson.

Robert Jones, alias Robert Parker, a seventeen-year-old negro youth, was placed on trial in the Elizabeth City County Circuit Court yesterday afternoon on an indictment charging him with burglary, and the jury after being out about an hour reported its inability to arrive at a verdict. As the case is one in which the death penalty can be inflicted Judge Robinson turned the jury over to the custody of Sheriff R. K. Curtis and will permit the twelve men to again attempt to reach an agreement this morning. Jones is charged with going to the home of Mrs. Frank Tennis, better known as Mrs. Riley Tennis, a white woman, and after ransacking her room, assaulted her by striking her in the head with a piece of iron.

### Tokener Goes Free.

In the Circuit Court yesterday morning G. L. Tokener, the aged inmate of the National Soldiers' Home, was acquitted of the charge of attempting to criminally assault Mary Brill, a twelve-year-old negro girl. Tokener is 70 years old and while the case against him was strong from a circumstantial view the jury refused to convict him and was out only a few minutes when the verdict of "not guilty" was returned.

## GOOD INDUSTRY TO BE LOCATED IN HAMPTON

"Plaster Products Company, Incorporated" secures a Charter From the State Commission.

The Plaster Products Company, Inc., is the name of a new manufacturing concern for the city of Hampton, which has just received a charter of incorporation from the Virginia state corporation commission in Richmond.

The new concern has as its president, Mr. George W. Rowe, Mr. Vernon Spratley is the vice-president and Mr. Guy A. Howard is the secretary-treasurer. The three named gentlemen also make up the board of directors.

The company is to have a capital stock of not less than \$150,000 nor more than \$250,000 and will engage in the plaster manufacturing business here.

It is understood that the concern has secured a site near the Chesapeake & Ohio depot and will immediately begin the work of establishing its plant. While the plant will start out with a limited force, it is expected that the concern will soon be the means of affording employment to 100 men.

It is proposed to manufacture the plaster to be used on the walls of buildings, as well as jars and other vessels made of such material.
