

HAMPTON, PHOEBUS AND OLD POINT.

DEATH CLAIMS MR WARREN P. HALL, SR.

Well Known Business Man Passed Away at an Early Hour Yesterday Morning.

Mr. Warren P. Hall, 76 years old, for many years a well-known and highly esteemed business man of Hampton, died in his residence in Bank street at 7:30 o'clock yesterday morning. Mr. Hall had been ill several weeks, but the news of his death came as a shock to his family and friends.

Funeral services will be conducted from the First Methodist church tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock and will be attended by Greble Lodge of Odd Fellows, of which Mr. Hall had long been a member. Mr. Hall was at the time of his death and had for several years been a member of the official board of the First Methodist church and his life set an example worthy of emulation. He performed many acts of charity, but without ostentation.

Mr. Hall was born in New York on October 7, 1832. He took to the waters, and for several years followed the vocation of a ship carpenter. He visited several foreign countries. In 1874 Mr. Hall came to Hampton and established a marine ship railway and small boat building plant. He was successful in his undertakings. Mr. Hall married Miss Mary A. Porter of Brooklyn, N. Y., forty-two years ago, and she, with two sons and two daughters, Mrs. George H. Ellison and Messrs. Warren P. Hall, Jr., and J. Marshall Hall.

SAILOR HAD NARROW ESCAPE FROM DROWNING

John Faulkner Fell into Hampton Roads From the Launch of the Training Ship Dixie.

John Faulkner, a seaman on the cruiser Dixie, had a miraculous escape from drowning in Hampton Roads yesterday afternoon. He was on the stern of one of the Dixie's launches, when he fell into the channel of the Roads. The launch never missed the seaman and continued its trip to the ship. Faulkner wore heavy gun boots and was heavily dressed. He extricated himself from his boots and fought for some time in endeavoring to swim ashore, but the tide was too great and he made little progress. He finally gave up and had some under twice when a small launch reached him. He was taken from the water in an exhausted condition and brought to the Old Point wharf and given medical attention.

ATTEMPTED BURGLARY OF ROWE DEPARTMENT STORE
