BARGE HAMPSHIRE HITS THE COLLIER HANNIBAL

Vessel Dragged Anchor and Smashed into Collier Before She Could be Stopped.

During the height of the violent wind and rain storm yesterday afternoon the Scully barge Francis S. Hampshire which arrived in port yesterday morning from Providence and anchored in the stream, dragged her anchor and before the second anchor could be cleared and dropped overboard, the barge was carried into the bow of the United States Collier Hannibal, smashing the planks on the port quarter of the barge badly for distance of about twenty feet.

The Chesapeake & Ohio tug James Smith, Jr., got alongside of the barge shortly after she hit the steamer, towed her up the river, off the shipyard where she anchored.

It will be necessary for the barge to go to the shipyard for repairs before she can be loaded with a cargo of coal. It is likely that a survey will be held on her tomorrow to ascertain the amount of damage, and fix a money figure for executing the necessary repairs.

The Hannibal was not damaged by the collision.

BOTH ARE IN TRAINING.

Zello and Benny Jones Getting Ready For Their Match.

E. Zello, the strong man and champion middle-weight backlifter of the world, is in hard training in preparation for his match with Benny Jones, the local wrestler, which takes place at Armory Hall on the night of June 10.

Zello, who now weighs 164 pounds, ran four miles yesterday afternoon and took off two pounds. He will get down to his normal wrestling weight, 158 pounds. He is also using the grip machine and jumping the rope.

Benny, too, is very busy getting ready for the match. He is rowing numerous miles daily, and doing some running. He will weigh in at about 120.

Zello agrees to throw Jones three times in an hour of wrestling, ten minutes intermission to be allowed between falls. If Jones should get one fall he wins the match. The bout is for a purse of \$200 and the gate receipts.
