SUNDAY SCHOOL TALKS

Third Day's Session of Encampment Draws Big Crowd.

BUCKROE THE MECCA LAST NIGHT

Instructive and Entertaining Addresses Made Yesterday by Rev. W. R. Culom, T. B. Ray, I. J. Van Ness, A. T. Robertson and J. T. Watts.

Another day of excellent addresses on subjects of deep interest to the church, especially in the mission and Sunday school, occupied the attention of the third day's session of the encampment of the Virginia Baptist Association at Buckroe Beach yesterday. The attendance was greatly increased, as many from the various towns, cities and counties on the Virginia peninsula were in the Casino building at both the morning and afternoon sessions. The intensely warm weather drove crowds to the beach during the evening and sea breezes proved a balm to the heated brows of those on the beach and in the Casino building.

The session in the morning began with devotional exercises and a song service. Following the preliminaries, Rev. T. B. Ray, D. D., of Richmond, whose addresses on missions have been greatly enjoyed by the delegates, discussed "The Contribution of Missions to the Sunday Schools." Dr. Ray was followed by Rev. W. R. Culom, of Louisville, Ky., who gave a learned and interesting address on "Revelations in the Times of Patriarchs."

This was another one of the educational addresses that have marked the sessions of the encampment up to this time. The closing address of the morning session was made by Rev. Dr. I. J. Van Ness, who spoke on "Some Developments in Sunday School Work." This talk was declared to have been most helpful to the Sunday school workers and those who heard the distinguished divine were elated over the splendid material they obtained by listening to Dr. Van Ness. Considerable time was consumed by the encampment in discussing "Adult Class Literature."

Night Session.

The session last night was filled with good, entertaining and solid food for the Sunday school workers. Rev. A. T. Robertson, D. D., of Kentucky, made a brilliant and highly instructive talk on "Miracles of Jesus," and Rev. J. T. Watts, D. D., secretary of the Sunday school board, interestingly discussed "The Definite Objects of Sunday School Endeavors." It was said by those in charge of the encampment that the second annual gathering of the Baptists for the summer has proven of great benefits to the church workers and that the results of the good talks the delegates are listening to are bound to prove of great material interest to the church in general throughout the state.

KISSES WIFE GOON BY; THEN SHOOTS HIMSELF

Hotel Man of King William Courthouse is Dying With Two Bullets in His Brain.

KIN WILLIAM, C. H., June 23.—A few minutes after kissing his wife good-bye and telling her he was going to kill himself, A. B. Hill, who was employed as jailor and who was engaged in the hotel business here a number of years, shot himself twice in the back with a pistol about 5 o'clock this morning and is dying.

Mr. Hill had become despondent and had been heard to say that he wanted to end his misery by ending his life. He received a severe blow on his head about twenty-five years ago and never fully recovered from it.

The hot weather of the last few days seemed to depress Mr. Hill. He seemed to become more despondent and inconsolable. Despite his remarks about ending his life it was thought he would not attempt it, consequently he was not guarded.

Mr. Hill has a large family of sons and daughters. Miss Mattie Hill, one of his daughters, is the only one living here.
