LOOKS LIKE ACCOMAC WILL HAVE A CANDIDATE

Local Committ's Action in Closing the Legislative Primary List not Accepted Across Bay.

According to reports received here from Accomac county, the Democratic committee of that county has repudiated the action of the Elizabeth City County committee in declaring the date for candidates to file notices in the legislative fight closed. The Accomac committee has named July 15 as the last day on which the candidates for the flouter delegate from Accomac and Elizabeth City counties can file their notice, and this would indicate that Accomac intended to put a candidate in the field against Mr. Harry R. Houston.

The fight will, in all probability, be carried before the Virginia State Democratic committee as the state committee will have to pass upon the regular nominee.

The local committee closed the list on July first, and no one filed a notice here but Mr. Houston. Accomac refuses to accept this action and has set July 15 as the last day on which the notices can be filed.

GOVERNMENT ON SPREE.

Spending More Money Than It Did During Spanish War.

Jefferson said that the accounts of the United States government should be as simple as those of a well-kept farm. So they are in some respects. For one thing, the income and the outgo, though expressed in terms of hundreds of millions, are as plain as the earnings and expenditures of a clerk or mechanic.

If a clerk or mechanic earned \$1,000 a year and spent \$1,200 he would soon be forced to discount new sources of income or get into trouble with his creditors. Uncle Sam is in the same predicament. Though his income is in the neighborhood of \$600,000,000 per annum, he is spending much more than that, and that is why we are hearing of new taxes at Washington.

Men sometimes become reckless and going on sprees, indulge in many extravagances from which they must recover by economy. So nations sometimes go to war and draw down their surplus and become involved in debt. If they do not return to the old habits of life, they must impose more taxes or suspend payment. The United States government spent more money last year than it did during the year of the Spanish war, and almost as much as the average yearly expenditure during the four years of civil war.

Marking Migrating Birds.

A short time ago a stork was shot in Rhodesia bearing upon its leg a metal ring which proved that the bird had been marked in Prussia, when it was a nestling, by the Rossien bird observatory, while more recently a stork similarly "ringed" in Hungary was shot in the Kallahari Desert.

H. F. Witherby in inaugurating a scheme for marking birds in a similar way in this country. It is hoped by this means to gain a more exact idea of the movements of individual birds than has ever been possible by any other method, and this should not only throw light upon the more general aspects of migration, but it should tell us a great deal that is at present obscure with regard to particular points.—Westminster Gazette.

NEW EAST HAMPTON INDUSTRY EMPLOYS 16

Chesapeake Mills, Owned by Messrs. R. H. Richardson & Son, Is Up-to-date Plant

The Chesapeake Mills is the name of a new industry, which has just started business in East Hampton, on the Chesapeake and Ohio tracks, and which is now giving employment to sixteen men. The plant is operated by Messrs. R. H. Richardson & Son, the Hampton builders and contractors, and the mill is said to be the most complete plant of its kind in Tidewater Virginia. The machinery installed is of the latest make. The plant covers a ground area of 210-400 feet.

Mr. R. V. Richardson, the manager of the plant, said yesterday that it is the intention of his firm to make the plant the best in Virginia and that the concern hopes to give employment to a large force of first class workmen regularly.

NO RESTRICTIONS OR PREMIUMS UPON CUPID

Idaho Town Advertiser for "Marrying Business" of Restricted Oklahomans.

SPOKANE, WASH., July 3.—Since the enforcement of the new criminal code in the state of Washington, effective June 11, which requires applicants for licenses to wed to bring with them certificate from physicians and recommendations from acquaintances attesting to their physical, moral fitness to marry, justices of the peace and ministers of the gospel at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, 32 miles east of Spokane, and Wallace, in the heart of the lead silver mining belt in the panhandle of Idaho, are vying with each other to make their respective abodes the Gretna Green of modern times. Here is a sample of the attractive manner in which printer's ink is used in the advertising sections of city newspapers to welcome the prospective June bride and her lover:

"Be married in Wallace, where no penalties, premiums or restrictions confront Cupid," Justice L. L. Leighty, "the marrying justice," will tie your knots with speed and dexterity."

Twelve licenses were issued in Spokane the first day the new code was in operation, and it is believed the total for the month will make a new record in this county.

Trade of the Philippines.

Pending legislation for closer commercial relations between the United States and the Philippine Islands finds especial interest to a statement of the commerce of those islands just compiled by the bureau of statistics from the summary of the commerce of the Philippine Islands, prepared in the bureau of insular affairs of the war department. It shows the total value of imports into the Philippine Islands in 1908 as \$29,189,120. Merchandise imported free of duty in connection with the construction of the railway systems of the Philippine Islands, amounting in 1908 to \$1,747,312, and merchandise imported for the use of the government, are not included in this total of \$29,189,120. The official figures of the United States Government of exports to the Philippine Islands in the calendar year 1908 show the total value of all merchandise declared for exportation to the island \$9,906,597; while the official figures of imports from the United States into the Philippine Islands, exclusive of government free entries and supplies granted free entry in connection with the construction of the railway systems of the Philippine Islands, in the same calendar year are but \$5,101,826, the discrepancy occurring chiefly by reason of the fact that the Philippine figures do not include supplies granted free entry in connection with the construction of the railway systems of the Philippine Islands and free entries for government use.

The principal imports are cotton manufactures, \$7,138,672, of which \$590,720 was from the United States; rice, \$5,552,571, of which none came from the United States; iron and steel manufactures, \$2,009,296 of which \$806,109 was from the United States; meat and dairy products, \$1,955,355, of which \$208,546 was from the United States; flour, \$943,922, of which \$539,923 was from the United States; animals, \$821,049, of which \$320 worth was from the United States; mineral oils, \$822,355, of which \$645,834 was from the United States; coal, \$577,507, of which none was from the United States; leather and manufactures of, \$557,919, of which \$410,591 was from the United States; spirits, wines, and liquors, \$445,737, of which \$120,791 was from the United States; vegetables, \$329,799, of which \$66,451 came from the United States; paper and manufactures of, \$475,737, of which \$148,188 was from the United States; fibers and manufactures of, \$420,952, of which \$1,037 was from the United States; wood and manufactures of, \$378,052, of which \$183,574 came from the United States; fish, \$219,036, of which \$94,474 was from the United States.

Te exports in 1908 amounted to \$32,601,972, the principal articles being: Hemp, \$16,591,956, of which \$7,797,926 went to the United States; copra, \$6,058,885, of which \$220,852 went to the United States; sugar, \$3,703,641, of which \$1,966,166 went to the United States; tobacco, unmanufactured, \$1,708,756, of which none went to the United States; manufactures of tobacco, chiefly cigars, \$1,117,286, of which \$18,748 went to the United States; all other articles, \$1,510,547, of which \$44,923 worth went to the United States.

The imports, by principal countries, stating them in order of magnitude, were in 1908—from East Indies, \$5,191,836; Australasia, \$2,256,685; China, \$2,162,996; Japan, \$228,172; Spain, \$1,261,444; British East Indies, \$865,871; France, \$899,511; Switzerland, \$682,231; Hongkong, \$423,811; Belgium, \$359,925; Dutch East Indies, \$283,834; and Slam, \$281,906. The exports, stated in order of magnitude, were in 1908—to the United States, \$19,549,755; United Kingdom, \$7,642,443; France, \$4,329,761; Hongkong, \$2,587,199; Spain, \$1,857,512; China, \$1,510,547; Belgium, \$829,482; and British East Indies, \$749,099.
