

GILLESPIE WILL BE REPUBLICAN NOMINEE

Local G. O. P. Leaders Say Convention Will Name Tazewell County Man By Acclamation

HAS RECONSIDERED HIS DECISION

According to Reports Here, He Has Consented to Make the Run for Governor—Program for the Convention Issued—Arrangements About Complete.

According to local Republican leaders, the Republican State convention, in session here next week, will nominate Hon. A. P. Gillespie, of Tazewell county, for governor of Virginia to oppose the Democratic nominee in the election in November. The name of Mr. Gillespie will not, it is said, be placed before the convention and the nomination of Mr. Gillespie will be by acclamation.

This announcement will cause great surprise throughout the state as Mr. Gillespie announced when his name was first mentioned several months ago in connection with the nomination that he would not accept. Local Republicans say, however, that he was induced recently to reconsider and has consented to be the party nominee.

Conventions Endorsed Kent. After Mr. Gillespie had announced that he would not accept the nomination, the name of Mr. William P. Kent was prominently mentioned in connection with the nomination and many of the county and city conventions held to elect delegates to the state meeting here endorsed Mr. Kent. However, the statement is made that these delegates will gladly vote for Mr. Gillespie as the Republicans generally in the state regard Mr. Gillespie as the strongest gubernatorial candidate the party can put forth at this time, etc.

Final arrangements for the convention have been about completed. The convention will be called to order by State Chairman C. Isaac Slemo in the Academy of Music at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning and Rev. E. W. Wellford, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will offer the invocation. Mayor Maryus Jones will deliver the address of welcome to the delegates, being introduced by President W. S. Copeland, of the Chamber of Commerce. State Chairman Slemo will deliver an address immediately after the mayor concludes his speech. A temporary organization will then be effected, a temporary chairman being named and committees appointed.

Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock the delegates will be taken on the Old Dominion steamer Brandon for a trip down the harbor and around Old Point. The steamer will leave Old Dominion pier A. While the delegates are on this trip, the committees will hold their meeting to formulate reports to the convention.

The convention will be called to order at 8 o'clock Wednesday night and Secretary Nagel, of the department of commerce and labor, will deliver an address.

Final Session Thursday. The final session of the convention will be held at 10 o'clock Thursday morning. At that time the convention will nominate the full state ticket, including candidates for governor, lieutenant-governor, attorney general, secretary of the commonwealth, state treasurer, commissioner of agriculture and superintendent of public instruction.

The program for Thursday is as follows: Invocation, Rev. Lloyd T. Wilson pastor of the Newport News Baptist church; report of committee on credentials; report of committee on permanent organization; election of permanent chairman; address of permanent chairman; reports of committees; nominations of candidates, and routine business.

Seating of Delegates. The delegates from the Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth and Tenth districts will occupy seats on the main floor of the Academy, and those from the First, Second, Third and Fourth districts will occupy the first balcony. The press representatives will occupy the lower left hand boxes and the committee on credentials will be stationed in the north wing of the stage. The headquarters of the committee on permanent organization will be at the Newport Hotel and the committee on platform at the Warwick Hotel.

The committee appointed this week to entertain the delegates during their stay in this city met last night at the office of Mr. Henry B. Holmes and discussed a plan of action. It was decided to have delegations meet all of the incoming trains and boats next Tuesday afternoon and night and to have the entire committee meet at the Warwick hotel at 8:30 o'clock Wednesday morning.

Arrangements Completed at Conference for Meeting at Washington Avenue and Twenty-ninth Street—Col. Mann in the City.

About thirty of the more active friends of Judge Mann in this city held a conference last night with Col. James Mann, of Norfolk, nephew of the judge, and his campaign manager and organized the Newport News Mann Club. Officers were chosen as follows:
