JEFFRIES POSTS FORFEIT FOR CHAMPIONSHIP FIGHT

After Putting Up \$5,000, He Announces His Ability to Defend His Title.

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, July 28.—Actual steps looking to a fight between James J. Jeffries and Jack Johnson for the heavyweight championship of the world was taken today, when Jeffries, on his arrival from the west, posted \$5,000 as a forfeit to bind a match with the negro pugilist for a fight of anywhere from 20 to 100 rounds. Jeffries insists that the fight shall be held before the club offering the largest purse, and that when articles are signed an additional forfeit of \$5,000 shall be posted.

JOHNSON SAYS HE'S READY.

Thinks He Can Clean Up Jeffries in Fifteen Rounds. JACKSON, MICH., July 28.—"I'll leave Chicago Monday night for New York and cover that forfeit," said Jack Johnson, the colored champion pugilist of the world this evening when shown a despatch to the effect that Jeffries had posted a forfeit in New York of \$5,000 to fight Johnson and again place the honor of championship among the white race. "I will be ready to fight almost any time I think I am in condition now to clean up Jeffries within 15 rounds." Johnson said he preferred to meet Jeffries in San Francisco.

DANVILLE, VA., July 28.—Secretary Farrell, of the National baseball commission, last night telegraphed the management of the Danville club forbidding Catcher Laughlin from playing on account of a protest filed by the Spokane, Wash., team, which claims him. Laughlin was with the St. Paul club, of the American association in 1908, and was either sold or transferred by that club to the Spokane club.

Laughlin claims that St. Paul did not pay him his salary in full, and sold him in order to cut his salary. He claims that he has papers which will show him to be a free agent.

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MAN WHO STABBED WIFE BEHIND BARS NOW

Richmond, Detectives Nab Morris Seigel at New Kent Court House.

RICHMOND, VA., July 28.—Morris Seigel, the man who stabbed his wife with an ice pick yesterday morning, is now lodged in a cell at the First police station, having been captured shortly after 10 o'clock last night by Detectives Wren and Wiltshire, at New Kent Courthouse.

The prisoner had a start of three hours on the officers, and had it been an hour later doubtless Seigel would have made his escape. The officers having received information that he had gone in that direction, procured vehicles and with the assistance of J. C. Lyne, of Seven Pines, they were able to make the trip and overtake Seigel. Several times the detectives were compelled to change horses in order to make time. They capped on the prisoner's trial and when they arrived at New Kent they inquired of persons there if a stranger had been seen. In a few minutes they had located him and placed him under arrest.

He was brought to Richmond this morning over the Southern railroad and will be called up tomorrow morning in the police court.

It was surprising to the detectives that the man had covered so much distance in such a short time. Seigel was making ready for his escape when overtaken. It was his intention to get aboard one of the many lumber schooners which run from New Kent down the York and thence to Baltimore and New York. He does not deny having stabbed his wife, but claims that she had threatened his life for a number of years.

The condition of the wounded woman was reported to be favorable this morning and it is believed she will recover, unless blood poison should set in.

GOVERNOR RECEIVES COPY.

Proposed Amendment to Constitution Submitted to Virginia.

RICHMOND, VA., July 28.—Governor Swanson today received a copy of the proposed amendment to the constitution of the United States, with reference to the taxation of incomes. The document comes from Secretary of State Philander C. Knox. The governor is expected to present this proposed amendment to the general assembly at its next meeting for approval or rejection.

Each State receives a copy, and the concurrence of three-fourths of them is necessary for the amendment to become effective.

Slayer of Negro Acquitted.

WOODFORD, CAROLINE, July 28.—Samuel J. Bullock, who lives near Port Royal, Caroline county, Va., was acquitted last evening in the Circuit Court of the charge of killing Edmund Mercer, a negro. It was proved that the negro killed was one of a party of three who were armed, attempted to tear up a bridge, the only outlet from Mr. Bullock's home. Mr. Bullock warned them not to molest the structure and as a final result shot one to death. Mr. Bullock was represented by Harry M. Smith, Jr. of Richmond, and C. J. Jesse, of Bowling Green.

NEW YORK, July 29.—Harry C. Pulliam, who shot himself last night in his room at the New York Athletic Club in an attempt to commit suicide, was still alive at 2:15 this morning.

It was said, however, that he could hardly survive more than a few hours. His friends this morning said that continued ill health was chiefly responsible for his attempt to kill himself.
