First National Conservation Congress at the Seattle Fair

SEATTLE, WASH., Aug. 7.—The First National Conservation Congress of the United States, which will be held in the Auditorium of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, August 25-28, 1909, promises to be the largest convention of eminent men ever called on the Pacific Coast. The Executive Board of the Washington Conservation of the United States, Canada and Hawaii has accepted the invitation to attend the Congress and participate in the deliberations.

It is expected that a permanent National organization will be effected at the Congress, and that delegates to the International Conservation Conference to be held at The Hague, Holland, during the coming autumn, when systematic plans for the conservation of natural resources of the entire civilized world will be considered will be appointed.

close with a religious conservation service on Sunday, August 29th, in which various church societies are expected to participate. Speakers of national reputation have been chosen for the occasion.

Among those expected to deliver addresses at the congress are Hon. R. A. Ballinger, Secretary of the Interior; Clifford Pinchot, chairman of the joint committee on conservation between States and Nation; Senator Reed Smoot, Utah; Joseph M. Dixon and Paris Gibson, of Montana; Ex-Governor George C. Pardee of California; Booker T. Washington, of the Tuskegee Institute; Howard Elliott, of the Northern Pacific, and James J. Hill, of the Great Northern Railway System, and many others of national prominence.

Several illustrated lectures, showing the various features of conservation are being arranged for the entertainment and instruction of the delegates. Chief among these are lectures on "Conservation of Forests," by A. C. Shaw, of the Forest Service, Washington, D. C., and W. L. Finley, of the National Association of Audubon Societies, and author of the well known work on "American Birds Photographed from Life." Some of the various irrigation projects now under way will be described by illustrated lectures by prominent men connected with the Reclamation Service of the United States. In addition to the special features, the practical lessons of conservation presented in the building and on the grounds of the Exposition constitute one of the greatest attractions for the student, the investor and the homeseeker in the West.

Every phase of the conservation movement is to receive attention at the hands of practical men selected from among the leaders of thought in the nation. Such subjects as irrigation, forests, water, mining, soils, good roads, and other means for transportation, pure food, public health and morals are to be handled by specialists drawn from every part of the country.

It is expected that President William H. Taft and several members of his cabinet will join the delegation of United States senators and representatives who have announced their intention of being present at the congress. The legislature of the State of Washington has memorialized President Taft and requested his attendance at the opening session. The Chairman of the Washington State Conservation Commission has issued a special proclamation inviting all conservationists in the United States, and the Seattle Chamber of Commerce has joined with the Washington Conservation and extended an invitation to all commercial organizations to be present and take part in the Congress. Conservation is a live topic for discussion in the State of Washington—a state which comprises a large area of land water in which are to be found many of the natural resources bestowed by nature on man. The hand of man guided by the spirit of com-

mercialism is rapidly wasting the substance in forest and stream and something must be done to conserve our resources while there are resources to conserve.

The people of the state invite the thinking men and women of every other state to join them in working out some plan for protection and perpetuating the natural resources in such a way as to insure present prosperity and future wealth without endangering any of the legitimate industries.

The problem is a practical one that demands the consideration of practical men, and for that reason the best minds of the day are being called into consultation in the First National Conservation Congress.
