**FUGITIVE IS ARRESTED**

Bennie Harris, Wanted in Bloodfield  
for Murder, Caught at Cape Charles

**KILLING OCCURED IN "CRAP" GAME**

Police Say Prisoner Stabbed John  
Rogers Over Two Cents in Dawson  
City Two Months Ago—Will be  
Brought Back for Trial.

Bennie Harris, alias Cree, a young negro, who has been wanted by the Bloodfield police since August 8 on the charge of murder, was arrested yesterday at Cape Charles. Chief Madison, of Bloodfield, was notified by telegram of the arrest and he will send a man to Cape Charles to bring the prisoner back for trial.

The killing occurred at Dawson City, just below Chesapeake & Ohio coal pier No. 12, and was the outgrowth of a dispute over the ownership of three cents, the stakes in a game of "craps" in which the two men, with several other negroes, were engaged on the river shore. Harris escaped after the murder.

According to the police, Harris concealed Rogers' body in some bushes nearby after stabbing him through the heart with a dirk-like instrument and it was several hours after the crime before the body was discovered. A negro woman, who lives nearby, found the body and notified the police.

Several of the negroes who were in the game will be witnesses against Harris.

**GRAND JURY SUMMONED  
FOR CORPORATION COURT**

Judge Barham Starts October Criminal  
Term Tomorrow—Gets Decision  
in Bank Case.

Judge T. J. Barham will convene the Corporation Court for the regular October term tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. The grand jury was summoned yesterday and it probably will be in session all day Monday so that no trials will be held that day.

Among the criminal cases to be considered by the grand jury are those of Lemuel Harris, alias Sam Harris, etc., a negro, who is charged with forgery on three counts; Sarah Yates, colored, for selling cocaine, and David Reside, white, forgery.

Several cases of non-support of wife and family are to be taken up at this term and a few appeals from the police will be heard. The case of J. L. Tolliver, a negro lawyer, charged with practicing law without a license, also will be disposed of at this term.

Judge Barham has set the dates for the trial of the cases continued over from the September term as follows:

Tuesday—Ernest Covington, William Wilson, and Meredith Jasper, all colored, malicious cutting.

Wednesday—Richard Lomax, colored, felonious assault. Several cases that will go before the grand jury also probably will be tried on this day.

Thursday—Mary Williams, colored, felonious cutting.

Friday—William Smith, colored, larceny from the person.

Judge Ingram, of the Law and Chancery Court of Richmond, will come here sometime during the October term to render his decision in the suit of the depositors against the officers and stockholders of the Saf-

ings Bank of Newport News. When the criminal cases have been disposed of, Judge Barham will devote the remainder of the term to the trial of civil matters now pending before the court.
