Special interest attaches to the election in Newport News today because of the unprecedented situation that exists in regard to one of the local contests. It is practically a certainty that all of the Democratic nominees except one will receive handsome majorities in the city.

The selection of Mr. Wallace and the reputation of Cox were unanimously approved by a mass meeting of Democrats called for the purpose of passing upon the committee's action, and it would seem that this should make certain Mr. Wallace's election. However, Mr. Cox, refusing to recognize the authority of the district and city committee or that of the mass meeting, and apparently unable to appreciate the fact that people who stand for honesty and clean government cannot conscientiously support him, persists in declaring that he is the Democratic nominee, and his name will appear on the ticket today with that of Mr. J. W. Hester, the Republican nominee.

Some people are going to vote for Cox in spite of the recent revelations concerning him and in spite of his reputation by the committee and mass meeting. There will not be enough of these people to elect Cox, but unless all true Democrats rally to the support of Wallace the vote given Cox may result in the election of the Republican candidate.

It may be that Cox will get a few hundred votes, enough to make the contest between Wallace and Hester close, but his election hardly can be considered to be within the range of possibility. Democrats should scratch the names of both Cox and Hester and write that of Wallace on the ticket. It will be a great triumph for the Democratic party if the nominee for constable is elected under the existing conditions, but there is no reason why he should not be elected. Nearly sixteen hundred votes were cast in the Democratic primary. If just half of this number will vote for Wallace today a majority for the straight Democratic ticket will be assured.

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WILL APPEAL CASE TO SUPREME COURT

Depositors of Wrecked Savings Bank Dissatisfied With Judge Ingram's Decision.

Captain C. C. Berkeley, of counsel for the depositors of the wrecked Savings Bank of Newport News, announced yesterday that the depositors will take an appeal to the Supreme Court of Virginia from the decision of Judge John H. Ingram, of Richmond, which was delivered here Saturday.

The depositors are dissatisfied with Judge Ingram's decision in the case. He exonerated all of the defendants except Dr. Carter Perkins, Dr. Clarence Porter Jones and A. T. Pulliam. The appeal, so far as naming those responsible for the loss is concerned, will, it is said, be directed towards City Sergeant E. W. Milstead, City Treasurer J. M. Curtis, Dr. Noah Jackson and L. F. Barnes. Plans for beginning an appeal, which will cost about \$5,000, are already under way, and it is expected that large number of the 700 depositors of the bank will be represented in the action.

ALL THREE CONFIDENT

Hearst, Bannard and Gaynor Each Claiming Victory.

CLOSE OF HOT CAMPAIGN

Tammany Leader Murphy Declares His Man Will Get More Votes Than Other Two Combined—The Republican-Fusion Ticket.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—New York's triangular political campaign ended tonight. William J. Gaynor, the Democratic candidate for the mayoralty, made his final speech in Harlem, Otto T. Bannard, candidate of the Republican and Fusion forces, closed his campaign with a noon-day address on the water front and a brief talk to negro voters at a downtown Baptist church in the evening.

Hearst, the independent candidate, wound up his formal speech-making last night at Madison Square Garden, but some of the lesser lights of his independent campaign burned red hot and expounded his cause with a final burst of oratory at open air meetings in the four corners of Manhattan tonight, while many of the minor candidates on both Democratic and Republican tickets had meetings of their own in the doubtful districts.

Confidence in Rival Camps. In each of the rival camps complete confidence in the result was expressed. Charles F. Murphy, the Tammany leader, said: "We are well satisfied with the result of the Democratic campaign. Gaynor will receive more votes than both the other candidates for mayor, and he will carry the whole Democratic ticket with him in every borough."

Herbert Parsons, the Republican leader, said: "Our fight against Tammany misrule has won. Reports from every assembly district in the greater city show that Bannard will be elected by 50,000 plurality. The entire Fusion ticket will go through with a landslide vote."

Charles H. Gehring, for the Hearst forces, said: "Hearst will get more than 300,000 votes, winning by over 100,000 plurality over the Tammany ticket. I look for a landslide to Hearst."

600,000 Votes to be Cast. All three sides were agreed that about 600,000 votes would be cast tomorrow out of the total registration of 644,500. About \$125,000 was wagered on the result of the mayoralty contest in New York today. In the financial district the prevailing orders favored Gaynor by about 2 to 1.

Bannard, in his closing appeal to the voters at his noon meeting today said: "I have fought this campaign against Tammany Hall, against corruption, waste, graft and improper contracts. Public improvements must be solely for the public good and not for plunder. Petty graft must be stamped out. I have favored as liberal personal liberty as is consistent with law and order."

"I believe that I can serve you well and that tomorrow you will choose a business man, a man who will attend to the duties of the office to which he is elected."

The final word in the Hearst campaign came in a brief statement from the Hearst headquarters, expressing confidence in the result and promising a clean and independent government of the city for four years to come.

Round-up of Repeaters. There were big round-ups of alleged repeaters today as a result of the investigations of the registration rolls by the state superintendent of elections and his men. One man, convicted of illegal registration, was sentenced to three years in Sing Sing while two others got indeterminate sentences of from six months to four years. A special grand jury in the Borough of Queens (Long Island) returned fifty indictments tonight against men alleged to have registered illegally.

The courts are prepared to handle a great volume of election day business tomorrow. Four justices of the Supreme Court were assigned to sit in special term at the New York county courthouse. Eight other justices announced that they would hear election cases in other parts of the city.

Among the watchers at the polls will be nearly 2,000 student volunteers recruited from Columbia, Yale and Princeton.

Bitter Underlying Struggle. This brief but spirited campaign has been conducted largely upon the old issue of opposition to Tammany Hall, but aside from the mayoralty contest there has been a bitter underlying struggle for the capture of the "board of estimate and apportionment," in a body which during the four years of the next administration will control the expenditure of nearly a billion dollars, including public improvements and the annual budget which this year is approximately \$145,000,000.
